

Iida Rauma (b. 1984) is an author living in the city of Turku. Her debut novel *The Book of Disappearances* was published in 2011 and nominated for the Helsingin Sanomat Literature Prize. Her 2015 novel *On Sex and Mathematics* was nominated for the European Union Prize for Literature and won both the Kalevi Jäntti Prize and the Torch-bearer Prize. Her third novel, *Destruction* (2022), has been received with rave reviews.

## Destruction

A case study of a person who was nearly destroyed, a city destroyed time and time again, and a planet that is being destroyed right now.

While jogging at night, A sees a familiar figure at the city's desolate fringes and realizes nothing ends, nothing is over. So begins a breathless, desperate attempt to hunt down and escape the past across the ravaged city of Turku, into the water-damaged classrooms of the 1990s and a darkness for which there are no words but still must be expressed.

Destruction asks how one can write about oneself if one's own self has been shattered. How can we document the horrors of one's childhood in a culture where adults hate children and want to erase the traces of past wrongs?


Iida Rauma's third novel succeeds at the impossible. The furious urge to remember, a love for the marvelous history of a burned and demolished city as well as pain that strikes at the core are woven into a stunning tableau of violence, its rings spreading out to the ends of the earth.

*Destruction* demonstrates the ability of literature to tell the truth when all other ways of speaking have been denied or condemned as lunacy.

# When boys play wargames, everything happens here and now.

With the cruel nations of yore prowling the borders of the Republic of Matara, neither birthright nor wealth excuse one from the military drills that ensure the realm's safety.

Under the guidance of his older brother, a young boy trains to be a scout. While spying, the pair come upon an enemy camp: war is at hand.

In the evening, they return to the academy to rest.


Matara is the story of boys who spend their summers building realms of their own. Senators scheme in togas made of sheets, mannequins make for wives, and circus entertainments are devised to thrill the charcoal-whiskered rabble. A blow from a wooden sword means a death from which there is no return. And foreign people are treated the way they generally are—pitilessly.

Matias Riikonen's fourth novel takes children seriously in a way few other works have. In Riikonen's hands, the birdsong-filled woods of early summer and the boys' violence and tenderness meld into superb, startling literature. At times one forgets one is reading a portrayal of boys at play; at others, one fears one is reading a description of reality.

*Matara* has been awarded the Torch-bearer Prize, it was a nominee for Finland's biggest literary award Finlandia and is currently a nominee for the Runeberg Prize.

# To My Brother

"My brother is a beautiful man who loves beautiful women, but he has an ugly sister he loves too. That's me."

A greedy, lonely girl watches her beautiful, popular brother atop the sensual bodies of his girlfriend candidates—his "candies." She eyes their breakfast toast, thick smears of fig jam on chevre.

If someone were to look at the girl, they might see a loser who binges on sweets, devours soap operas, and trails her brother like a shadow but whose manic narration forces one to stare, to look more closely.


To My Brother doesn't ask any direct questions. Even so, listening to its anti-hero prompts thoughts about sibling relationships, caretaking, lust, and social and sexual hierarchies. It's an absurd bildungsroman germinating from internalized self-hatred, one that takes place at the fringes if the center is a multi-part mirror. A silver scooter racing at maximum speed. An eccentric is attached to its rotating axel, transforming forward momentum into back-and-forth motion.

Which way should you turn now?

My favorite film is called À ma soeur, literally "To My Sister." In it, a fat French girl heads off for summer holidays with her thin, beautiful older sister. She lies awake in the room the two of them share, listening to her sister take it up the butt so the sister can have sex while preserving her virginity. At the end, during the journey home, there's an accident that kills everyone except the protagonist. A man who emerges from the woods engages in intercourse with the fat girl, and she's happy. The director dedicated the film to her sister. That's where the title, À ma soeur, came from.

If I made a movie, I would dedicate it to my brother.

# 101 Ways to Kill Your Husband

# An Oulipo-esque murder mystery that twists a real-life tragedy into 101 wild and meticulous poses.


In October 1981 Anja B. from Finland took a shotgun to her Norwegian husband Thorvald's chest and fired. He died immediately. On the 5th of May 1983 history was made as the District Court of Oslo not only released her from the murder charges but found her late husband guilty because of the physical abuse he had inflicked on her for years.

The case has now shapeshifted from the subject of tabloids and crime magazines to a methodical murder mystery by Laura Lindstedt and Sinikka Vuola. The book serves us Anja B.'s story via different methods and various narrative styles that are in turn witty, surprising, touching, skilful, or garnished with a dose of gallows humour. The writers break the dismal convention of a crime stories that begin with the discovery of the body of a young woman. This time it is the violent husband who dies—101 times over.

The variations of Lindstedt and Vuola dazzle the reader whilst they unravel a tragic story of domestic abuse that ended up in the tabloids.

# This Woman's Life

# Nothing has happened here that I don't want to remember.

On the morning of the funeral, fifteen-year-old Helena puts on a red dress and eyes herself in the mirror. Her mother is dead; her father is waiting outside in his black suit. Helena thinks about eyebrows, boobs, and her boyfriend Johannes—so she won't have to think about her mother and especially her own grief, her own feelings of guilt.

Helena grows from adolescence to adulthood, but memories of a childhood overshadowed by her mother never age and refuse to be forgotten.

"My throat constricts with grief, and I decide today is the day I'll tell Dad. I'll tell him about those days. I'll tell him Mom is lying when she said we went to the park and the pool and the store. I just don't know how to get the words out; I've tried so many times. Or maybe Dad already knows but is also unable to say anything. As if there were some agreement. As if the three of us had at some point made the joint decision that this is perfectly normal and appropriate. As if we were a totally normal family."

This Woman's Life is a novel that moves through time in an extraordinarily beguiling manner, leaving an indelible mark on the reader.

Karin Erlandson (b. 1978) is a Finnish author writing in Swedish. She has published four novels: the Nordic Council Literary Prize nominee *Mink Farm* (2014), *The Misdeed* (2016), *Enclosed* (2018) and *Home* (2021). She has also written a four-part series of children's novels called Song of the Eye Gemstone. The first novel of the four, *Pearl Fisher* (2017) received the Runeberg Junior Prize and was nominated for the Nordic Council Children and Young People's Literature Prize, similarly to the fourth novel *Victor* (2019) and Erlandsson's stand-alone middle-grade adventure *Night Express* (2020), illustrated by Peter Bergting. # What about the stories of those who stayed home?



Anneli Kanto (b. 1950) is an author and screenwriter. Her debut novel, *The Devil, the Count, the Witch, and the Actor* (2007), was a well-received Runeberg Prize nominee. Kanto won the Kaarle award for *Blood Roses* (2008), a novel about the women of the Red Guard during the Finnish civil war. Her novel *The Executioner* (2015) was awarded the City of Tampere Literary Prize and nominated for the Torch-bearer Prize. The novel *Butchers* (2017) tells of a White army military campaign during the civil war. # The Rat Saint

In this sensory, color-saturated novel by a master of historical fiction, a brickmaker's foster daughter grows into an artist.

It's the dawn of the 16th century, and a small village in southern Finland sees the arrival of a curious trio possessing special skills and knowledge: they are church painters in an era when artists were unheard of in the remote north. The arrivals are Master Martinus, who is responsible for practical arrangements, the stern, impatient artistic soul Andreas Pictor, and their apprentice, Vilppu.


The church-painting begins, but the scaffolding is shaky. There's an accident, and Vilppu falls. A woman is called in to take his place: Pelliina, foster daughter to the local potter and brickmaker. To her fellow villagers, Pelliina is an odd duck who has the evil eye; to the painters, she is an artist in the making, a peer.

As the history of the world from Paradise and the Fall to the Final Judgment takes shape on the walls of the church, romance, envy, treachery, and crime occur, and a life reaches a turning point. One story ends and another begins.

Anneli Kanto, a master of the historical novel, has written a *Künstlerroman* about a woman who chooses to model her self-portrait on Kakukylla, the saint who protects against rats and mice.

"Kanto's work is quite the encyclopedia of medieval life. It leads us into the potter's cottage with its pig-bladder windows, the bustle of the marketplace, complete with jugglers and strongmen, and the banquet tables of Häme Fortress. A pungent surge of sounds, smells, lights, work, and ingredients of the day crash into us. The evocative curses and insults would leave Captain Haddock of Tintin comic book fame a sorry second.

Above all, The Rat Saint is the story of an artist developing to maturity, Pelliina's coming-of-age novel, and a lofty hymn to forbidden, impossible love." Helsingin Sanomat newspaper

Pirkko Saisio (b. 1949) is an author, theatre director, actor and one of the best-known cultural figures in Finland. Her novel *The Course of Life* (1975) was awarded as the best debut of the year. Since then, Saisio has been nominated for the Finlandia Prize seven times, winning it in with *The Red Book of Farewells* (2003), the last novel in her autofictional trilogy, which marked her breakthrough to the top of Finnish fiction. She has, among other awards, received Aleksis Kivi Prize and State Literature Award. Today, her novels are considered modern classics.

## **Passion**

# Passion is like an arcane legend, and the tale it tells has the testimonial impact of myth.


It is May and the dawn of the 16th century. Dominican friar Girolamo Savonarola has been hanged and burned at the stake at the Piazza della Signoria. The fanatical ascetic nightmare has ended, Florence has been resurrected, and Princess Vasari can once again dress according to her rank and adorn herself in the extravagant necklace her husband has given her.

She knows the reason for the prince's generous gift but locks the painful secret in her breast. Ultimately the necklace is buried with her, but the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil does not rest long in the somber quiet of the tomb.

Half a century later, the goldsmith Yakob Masri hides the necklace beneath the plank floor of his workshop in the Cannaregio ghetto of Venice. Persecuted as Jews, he and his family must flee, and their long journey ends in Hapsburg Vienna.

But the now-transformed piece of jewelry changes owners again over the centuries, traveling to Krakow and further north, ultimately to Finland.

Passion is a grand vision: a color-saturated, Tarkovskian chronicle of Europe centered on life's purpose and the search for meaning. Spiritual seeking, faith, and ideology sustain all of us, but for some, a shared bloodline and heartbeat are the sole saving grace in the survival struggle known as life. It was nominated for Finland's biggest literary award, Finlandia.

Antti Leikas (b. 1967) has published five novels: a trilogy that carnivalizes office life, *Paddling* (2011), *Backpaddling* (2013), and *Rowing* (2015), and two works featuring the author himself, *The Darkness of Gnomes* (2019) and *The Quantum Gnomes* (2022), which combines gnomes with particle physics. The real-life author is a mathematician who has studied literature, philosophy, and business management and whose professional life has spanned technology companies, newspapers and magazines, and educational institutions.

# The Quantum Gnomes

# An expedition to the strange side, in which the universe itself is not safe.

The author Antti Leikas has writer's block. He has lost contact with the gnomes, and the structure of the universe will not reveal itself to him, even though he dreams about it every night.

Meanwhile, at CERN, the European Organization for Nuclear Research, preparations for a series of tests meant to reveal the secrets of dark energy are close to complete. But the instruments begin reacting to something surprising and strange, and alarm bells start ringing in the ears of the most eminent and eccentric researchers.

At the same time, a boat bobs on a peaceful pond in the middle of the forest, with two gnomes sitting in it. They don't catch much in the way of fish, but the mood is always more important anyway. This time the mood is ruined, though, for the gnomes have been sensing disturbances in cosmic background radiation. Not to mention the fact that something is awry in the mycelium that connects the thousands of gnomes worldwide: one of their number seems to have vanished.

The tranquil fishing trip must be abandoned and help sought from Leikas, who is linked to the gnomes in a mysterious way.

The Quantum Gnomes is a fast-paced picaresque novel with a spec-fic twist—an absurd adventure that refuses to submit to the laws of time and place. As the structures of the universe begin to tremble, a peculiar chain of events is set in motion, with parts played not only by the vast clan of gnomes and a self-doubting author, but by God, the most prominent physicists in the history of the world, and Leikas' deceased father.

# The Map of Going Astray

"There are so many ways things can go wrong that one of them has to be right."

Julia is going on a trip. Her father and mother call it a vacation, but there's something odd about the fact that they always have to sneak out and be on their way before the sun rises and then drive from day to day with almost no stops. As it turns out, there's no going home from these excursions.

Meanwhile, Jan is more interested in numbers and maps than he is in people. He is sent to camp in Lapland to make friends, but a wilderness hike there with his camp-mates turns into a struggle to stay alive.

Julia's and Jan's stories are woven together by a strand of mystery that leads the reader through chronologies and shifting perspectives, calling the logic of the world into question. Something seems to be drawing the book's wandering protagonists toward each other and an enigmatic house Julia catches glimpses of in her dreams.

The Map of Going Astray is a story about lost young people whose lives have been derailed from a sense of belonging and ordinariness. In order to survive, they must make choices between remembering and forgetting, and the focal point becomes time and its relentless advance.

Juhani Karila (b. 1985) is a journalist and an author. Karila won the J. H. Erkko Award in 2010 with a text that the jury called "phew!" prose. *Gorilla* (2013), Karila's first collection of short stories, won an enthusiastic reception and second place in the Helsingin Sanomat Literature Prize competiton. His second collection, *The Death of the Apple Crocodile* (2016), introduces more absurd stories. # Fishing for the Little Pike

The story of three days spent trying to catch a fish while fooled and foiled by an assortment of primeval nature beings.

Elina Ylijaako has returned to her home village in Eastern Lapland, as she does every year. She has three days to catch a pike. When a water sprite emerges from the pond and other ancient creatures soon join the game, Elina's fishing trip turns into a life-or-death adventure.

Meanwhile a police sergeant named Janatuinen is searching for Elina on suspicion of murder. But first the sergeant has to survive a fishing trip of her own with a local forest imp and make it through hex-night—a carnival of the dead that even the most hard-blooded witch in the village knows to avoid.

Mysterious creatures wander the tundra bogs like machines set in motion long ago that nobody knows how to turn off. An ancient demon finds a new home in the mayor. A farm hand who refuses to die starts sprouting branches and oozing menace. And in a little pond in the middle of the swamp lives the fish that everything depends on.

Fishing for the Little Pike is a linguistically virtuosic novel, at once love story and mythical fantasy, that will make you choke with laughter one minute and turn deadly serious the next.



# Way, Truth, and Death

A keen-eyed author spares neither herself nor the reader in this volume of surprising essays.

"Life is a journey, they say. What a lousy metaphor. After all, life's fundamental nature is stasis, repetition, routine. Life is weekday mornings, the dip in the sofa, taking out the compost, and what should we have for dinner. Maybe life is a journey for Bedouins, but not otherwise. A journey is a journey."

Silvia Hosseini's second volume of essays leads the reader on a meandering expedition from joy to sorrow, from beauty to dread. Drawing from literature, history, and the author's own experiences, the collection masterfully addresses the various transitions, assertions, and losses of the three titular themes through contemporary phenomena. The thinking is sharp, the expression beautiful.

In the essays, knowledge of culture and history combine in fresh insights and self-deprecation. The impact of Arab philosophy on Western civilization is examined through Sicily and Inspector Montalbano. In her essay on the Beat authors, Hosseini objects to the re-evaluation of old works of art on the basis of their worldview. Contemporary feminism comes under fire for being prejudiced and memeified. And in an essay on birds, Hosseini ponders the role of birds as symbols of life and messengers of death, as in the present day, when the vanishing of bird species predicts devastating ecological catastrophe.

Hosseini's voice is strong, and the compilation an unapologetic literary cornucopia. *Way, Truth, and Death* was nominated for the Toisinkoinen Literary Prize.

# The autofictional trilogy

One of the all-time masterpieces of Finnish literature from the working-class writer, queer icon and renaissance artist Saisio.

Pirkko Saisio's autofictional trilogy carries the reader through the childhood, adolescence and adulthood of a girl who wanted to be a boy and started calling herself "her" when she was eight years of age.

The trilogy starts with *The Lowest Common Multiple* (1998). In the beginning of the novel, the main character, "she", is already a middle-aged mother. When her father dies, things get shoved off their place. Her memories take her back to her childhood in the 1950s – to a story, which is also about to change.

In the second novel, *The Backlight* (2000), it is 1968, and the main character is travelling to Switzerland to work in an orphanage. With episodes from her grammarschool years, the reader follows her navigating the conflict between a leftist upbringing, Christianity, and her awakening sexuality.

The Red Book of Farewells (2003) starts in the politically turbulent 1970s. The main character begins her studies in the Theatre Academy, falls in love with a woman, and enters an adult life where there are to be farewells every now and then.

The strong themes of the trilogy—the relationship between an individual and the society, sexuality and being queer, and finding your voice—are told in a fragmentary, lyrical style, descriptive of Saisio. As the background, there is Helsinki, changing as the decades go by.

Each of the three novels was nominated for Finland's biggest literary award, the Finlandia Prize, *The Red Letter of Farewells* finally gaining it.




Katrina is a progressive woman for her time, and the novel *Katrina* was one of the first in Finland to tell a woman's story from her own perspective. The work depicts life during the early years of Finnish independence in the archipelago of Åland, in all its stark beauty as well as its suspicion of outsiders and turmoil: the political situation of the era is unavoidable in the islands, and criticism of those in power is often present in Katrina's gaze.

*Katrina* blends multiple genres, including the adventure story, and the narration and even tragic events are often accompanied by a quiet, intelligent humor. The novel's characters – both women and men – are unusually complete and complex: in other words, human.

*Katrina* was an international success in its day: a novel written in New York in 1936 by the cosmopolitan, Swedish-speaking Finn Sally Salminen. Rights to the work were sold to over 20 countries, and the work has risen to renewed success in Finland thanks to a new translation by Finlandia Prize-winning author Juha Hurme.

Märta Tikkanen (b. 1935) is a Finland-Swedish journalist, writer, and teacher. 

In the dystopian world of *Hotel Sapiens*, the world has been shattered in a catastrophe. A group of people has been stranded to a hotel – or rather, saved there by the artificial intelligence overseeing the world. In this setting, Krohn portrays her characters with the means of satire and black humor, the tension between the human mind and AL as the main theme.

# A hardboiled crime series set in the city of Vantaa – a rough-edged boomtown with brutal charm.


J.P. Pulkkinen's crime series is set in the city of Vantaa – a rough-edged metropolis just north of Helsinki city limits, where the building boom shows no sign of stopping. The realistic milieu grows to one of the main characters of the series, creating a special atmosphere and a tone for the novels.

The well-drafted setting is combined with credible characters and a complex web of relationships between people of today and the past. The main characters are police detective Timo Markkula and his rookie partner, Liina Vahtera. Refreshingly sober, sane and normal, despite some secrets in their past, the two come across hideous murders.

The Large Blue (2018) takes off with a flashback to 1971. Two eleven-year-olds sneak out to watch race car drivers in training. An accident happens, and it's also witnessed by a local construction tycoon. Forty years later the other of the boys, Timo Markkula, has become a police detective, the other has inherited the tycoon's empire – and ended up on the other side of the law, as it turns out. In an investigation accompanied by an escalating deathrate it soon becomes clear that the city has been built during the past decades with reckless disregard of the cost.

The White Crow (2019) starts with a brutal murder: a disputed politician is beheaded in an elevator. In the politically heated surroundings of Vantaa, there are not only web warriors and hatemongers—but now also a coldblooded killer. The investigation lands on the shoulders of Liina Vahtera and Timo Markkula, who has recently only narrowly escaped death and is still in recovery.

In *The Red Cupboard*, 8-year-old Helmi's mother disappears The mother's life is littered with alcohol, men and a lot of bad luck and indifference—but as Liina and Timo dig deeper, they find also genuine evil.





## Anna Glad series

# Tangeled threads of tricky crimes solved by an imperfect, middle-aged female constable trying to find her way in life.

The series of stand-alone whodunnits present the reader senior constable Anna Glad, who comes across not only crimes but also very relatable everyday problems of an ordinary woman. With a touch of romance and humour, Eva Frantz has created a heroine whom it is hard not to like.

In the novels, Frantz deals with issues of our social media era: hate speech, grooming, and isolation. The crimes are hideous, but the violence is not excessive, and with the small disasters that keep appearing in Anna Glad's personal life there is a delicate balance between suspense and coziness.

Awarded with the Clew of the Year Award and with sales of so far over 55,000 copies only in Finland, Anna Glad novels are the top of Finnish crime fiction.

The Blue Villa (2017) starts with a chilling scene, typical of Eva Frantz. Five-year-old Bruno wakes up in the middle of the night to a noise. He goes downstairs to find his mother Becca – but she doesn't wake up. As the investigation takes off, dark and dangerous things from her past start to surface.

In *The Eight Maiden* (2018), an early morning's winterswimmer gets the fright of his life when he bumps into something in the ice-cold water. Anna Glad is soon tangled in deeds brought on by the vicious culture of physical abuse which always flourishes around money and power.

Out of the Game (2020) is a jigsaw puzzle of a crime novel: A mother encounters a terrible surprise when she peeps at her baby in the stroller. An elderly opponent of a cycle lane goes missing, leaving behind only blood tracks. The American wife of a local ice-hockey legend is surrounded by an atmosphere of secrecy. Anna Glad, very late in her first pregnancy, seems to be running out of time to solve all the mysteries.

The group masterminds almost all of Europe's cocaine market, and its nefarious activities extend to kidnappings, murders and clan wars that have cumulatively led to thousands of deaths.

Despite this outsized influence, 'Ndrangheta is a surprisingly unknown criminal force. To the inhabitants of southern Italy, however, the organisation is a familiar presence. Locals trust it to look after their best interests better than their regional leaders, the police or even the Italian state.

Author Anton Monti has examined the 'Ndrangheta for years. In this uniquely comprehensive presentation of the syndicate, Monti describes how the organisation's strict code of conduct, religious imagery and cult-like rituals have turned it into a violent moneymaking machine. Before they know it, readers are caught up in this gripping story, where fact is more shocking than fiction.

Unlike the Sicilian Mafia, the 'Ndrangheta have managed to keep a low profile, avoiding any conflicts that could put the organisation in danger. Even so, the tally of bodies in its wake dwarfs that of Cosa Nostra and terrorism combined.

# The Greatest Leap Forward


China uses the latest technology to monitor the lives, actions and thoughts of its citizens ever more closely.

The Chinese leadership keeps watch on its citizens with advanced, intimidatingly effective surveillance technology. Combined with the dictatorship's ability to rapidly mobilise vast operations in the streets and cities, this means near-total surveillance is already possible.

The Greatest Leap Forward is a book by journalist Katarina Baer and photographer Kalle Koponen that describes the massive operations and increasingly total systems China has created to control and manipulate its citizens, and how it manages to keep 1.4 billion people inside its own bubble, unable to access the internet freely.

The authors follow the lives of three Shanghai residents during the corona spring of 2020: Julia, in her last year at school, together with her family; Xu, a barber, and Chunheng, a tourism entrepreneur. All of them are firm supporters of the Chinese Communist Party. Through their stories, the book tries find out why so many Chinese people, despite the repressive measures, are happy with the leadership of their country.

One of the most troubling questions raised in the book is what will happen if the use of Chinese surveillance systems becomes more widespread. The combination of robust surveillance technology and the use of digital big data collected from people would upset the balance of power between dictatorships and democracies and threaten the very foundations of personal privacy.

The Pakkanens came to Finland in 1990 as returnees from Russia, and in recent years have actively worked to throw light on the fate of the Ingrian Finns, one part of this work being *It Happened to Us* (2020), awarded as the best history book of the year. With photographer Meeri Koutaniemi they have put together an exhibition on Ingrian Finnish identity and collective remembrance at the National Museum of Finland.

## It Happened to Us

A father and daughter's journey into the nightmares of their family in the Soviet Union during the twentieth century.

In Lea Pakkanen's childhood the story of her grandmother's exile to Yakutia in Siberia, where she caught fish in the Arctic Ocean with her bare hands, seemed to her like an unbelievable fairy tale.

Lea's grandmother was an Ingrian Finn – a member of the Finnish minority that lived in the Soviet Union. Stalin's persecutions wiped out minorities and dissidents, and by the end of the 1940s the Ingrian Finns had been decimated by deportations, executions and prison camps. The fate of the people who survived became a taboo that could not be discussed until the end of the Soviet Union.

It Happened to Us describes the journey of Lea and her father Santeri to the places where their own family experienced the horrors of the persecutions. Father and daughter follow in the footsteps of a grandmother exiled by riverboat to Yakutia on the shores of the Arctic Ocean. They trace the fate of a grandfather, who ended up in the infamous Gulag in Northern Siberia. Eventually their journey takes them to the suburbs of St. Petersburg, where Russified neighbourhoods stand on the site of mostly purged Ingrian villages.

During their travels, Lea and Santeri look back also at their own journey from the post-Stalin era Soviet Union to modern day Finland. The cracks in Soviet totalitarianism that appeared in the 1980s allowed for a short Ingrian revival, which was cut short when most moved as returnees to Finland, a country that no longer remembered them.

It Happened to Us fills in the history that was silenced, but also makes accurate observations on the relation between state and identity, the role of minorities in national history narratives, and the importance of remembering and forgetting in families.
