Forest Field Notes

"People are short-sighted.
So, we must trust the trees."

Spruce has a journal where she draws and writes about things that come to mind while she's in the forest. She recognizes the secrets of the forest better than anyone else.

She finds trees leaning against each other, bird's nests, and caterpillar trails. Beneath the roots lies an elf door. She has seen a forest troll, a falcon, and a fawn. Spruce has saved all of her reflections, and the leaves she's collected, in her field notebook.

Soon men wearing overalls and carrying measuring sticks start to appear in the forest. Her brother, Saku, tells her the area has been zoned. Machines drive into the forest and leave stumps and deep ruts behind.

Spruce decides to fight back, and she starts by tying notes to trees with twine. It's a kind of protest.

That's when she meets a boy with green eyes and twigs in his hair. He teaches Spruce something about the forest she never anticipated. She records all of it in her field notebook.

Forest Field Notes is a tender, magical story of the forest and the imagination that can be awakened by nature. The book about the importance of nature in our own surroundings will gain a companion, *Travel Field Notes*, when it's published in 2023. This new addition will guide readers on a rail journey to protect the environment.

Leona is a young princess who does a runner when she learns of the fate that awaits her: she must marry a prince in order to save her kingdom.

Leona jumps from one princess fairytale to the next in order to save herself from the age-old burdens of princesses that lurk around every corner—marriage and household chores. Along the way she meets many characters including a melancholic mirror, the species-changing Swanhilda, and princes with a penchant for glass shoes, menacing pouts, and rescue mission obsessions—not to mention seven adult men who are short of stature and don't want to learn to clean and cook for themselves. The kind-hearted Leona helps everyone, but on her own terms. This princess refuses to be gentle, humble, and kind, just because that's what's expected of a fairytale princess!

The Princess Who Did a Runner is a picture book full of sharp humour that will even offer big children and adults plenty of food for thought.

And although Storm ventures out into the world alone, she always comes back, bringing the starts of wondrous flowers to plant among the seeds of Light's words.

"Does happiness live at home or out in the world?" Light asked.

"What about sadness? Where does it live?" Storm replied.

Light smiled. "In a contest between flavors, do potatoes beat chili peppers?"

"Is morning more beautiful in the Alps or from your own window?"

Storm and Light is a tender story of friendship and love. The individual stories of the characters interlace, and big questions of love and human connection overlap aphoristically with shared memories of a lovely summer day.

This is a fast-paced but profound story with plenty of tips for living closer to nature in a fun way.









Archie the Canary

A warmhearted series about the unexpected friendship of a canary and a taxi driver, filled with humour and deep thoughts.

The little canary Archie and the taxi driver Swisher are perhaps the most philosophical friends that there are in Finnish children's books. The two first meet when Archie is suffering from an illness and needs to see a doctor. But after listening to the little bird for a while there is no need for an appointment, after all: Swisher realizes what is wrong with her. She is dreaming of freedom.

This starts a series of day-to-day adventures for the two. From the southern beaches to the wintery streets of the north, there are bigger-than-canary issues to deal with: where is your place in the world, why is there sometimes a huge longing in your heart—and which things are those that are truly important in life.

Kristiina Lähde has written the stories with warm humour, big heart and deep understanding of the questions that are puzzling also the minds of small readers. Illustrated with bright and soft colours by Julia Vuori, the books about Archie the Canary are loved by children and grown-ups alike.

Swisher took a little book with a black cover out of his pocket, shyly cleared his throat, and read:

FOR ARCHIE
Looking at the evening star,
needing no place but where we are.
I sit beside you and keep you warm,
a friend to protect you from the storm.
What matters is what's right here,
it's simply as simple as that.

A Dog Called Cat series

A disarmingly beautiful picture book series about accepting difference and the importance of friendship.

A Dog Called Cat (2015) tells the story of a small puppy, whom her mother names Cat because Cats are independent, and the mother knows the puppy will end up alone. But the dog called Cat feels just lonely, not independent, until she meets a man called Weasel.

In the second book, A Dog Called Cat Meets a Cat (2019) the dog called Cat and the man called Weasel encounter a cat of an adventurous disposition. The cat, whose name has often changed during the vagabond years, becomes a cat called Dog and a third party to the true friendship they share.

The only problem the friends have is that they have no home. Even though they love roaming freely, winter can be cruel and the endless wandering tough. In *A Dog Called Cat Looking for a Home* (2020) Cat's heart is suddenly filled with longing, and she realizes the friends need to find a haven.

In A Dog Called Cat and the Wonder of Christmas (2021) the dog called Cat, the cat called Dog and the man called Weasel are walking in the empty streets of the snow-crusted city where everyone has retreated to celebrate with their nearest and dearest. There they realize how fortunate they really are.

The four-book series about three friends with a rougher lot in life deals with seeing people without prejudice and the importance of looking beyond the surface. The bittersweet, humorous books show life in all its guises and tell that even those of us with a rougher lot can experience joy and happiness.



A Dog Called Cat series spans four books: A Dog Called Cat (2015), A Dog Called Cat Meets a Cat (2019), A Dog Called Cat Looking for a Home (2020) and A Dog Called Cat and the Wonder of Christmas (2021).

A fast-paced, heart-felt adventure about looking for a father and learning to fly.

It's summer vacation, and ten-year-old Eevert has three items in his to-do list:

- 1. Learn to fly.
- 2. Save the city.
- 3. Find the head that's a perfect fit for the pilot's cap.

You see, Eevert has discovered he has a father – and not just any father, but a superhero! His father simply came and went so fast the only memento he left behind was a pilot's cap. Now Eevert has to find the head that fits the cap.

The city, on the other hand, needs to be saved from the dazzling, movie-star like Buber family, who have thrown everything into chaos by wrapping the city's residents in their stardust, making everyone forget what's important.

Eevert's superhero mission leads him into dangers he never could have imagined. Luckily he has the help of his friend Tilda and the lady with the low voice who lives upstairs, Mrs. Malmsten. My Dad Is a Hipster

"When I close my eyes, I see herds of bearded beanieheads, sometimes bumping into each other."

Nuutti and his friend Selma first hear about hipsters in fourth grade: it turns out that Selma's mother has called Nuutti's father a hipster. Nuutti doesn't understand. What on earth is a hipster? Could his father really be one? They need to find out.

After applying an eclectic mix of research methods and spying the kids come across a lot of curious facts: most often, a hipster will deny being a hipster; a subspecies of a hipster is a *blender*; a hipster can try to conceal his hipster identity by changing his Cousteau beanie for a *mysse* cap; Selma's mother is missing content in her life; Nuutti's father provides content, at least from kale, ginger and fungus; and the headmaster of the school is longing for a particular stew his grandmother used to make.

The new children's novel by Finlandia Junior-awarded Tomi Kontio catches the essence of being a kid. Solving the hipster issue grows into a warm-hearted story of longing, remembering, family and friendship. The beautiful illustrations by Elina Warsta are especially appealing for the young readers.




Finland's rising crime queen Eva Frantz has become known also for her novels for children, all of them featuring supernatural events and adorably creepy suspense. *Raspberry Hill* and *Queen of the Night* are both set in early 20th century, to settings perfectly suitable for ghosts, and they are sure to keep the middle-grade reader glued to the pages.

In Raspberry Hill, young Stina, suffering from a lung disease, ends up treated in a sanatorium in the middle of the healing countryside. The building is vast and full of long corridors and echoes. It is also a very lonely place, until one day Stina meets Ruben. The boy starts turning up when they should be sleeping, taking her to nightly expeditions to forbidden parts of the building.

Little by little Stina starts to realize that everything is not quite right in the sanatorium. Why isn't her mother writing back to her? Why do the nurses seem so afraid? What really happened in the fire? And what is Ruben trying to warn her about?

In Queen of the Night, 12-year-old Viktor has moved to Helsinki from Paris and is missing home. However, when his mother, an opera singer, gets the role of the Queen of the Night in *The Magic Flute*, things start to look up. Viktor makes friends with Agnes, the stage designer's daughter, who seems to have psychic abilities.

Soon it starts to seem there is something spooky and malevolent hidden beneath the foundations of the theatre—and peculiar accidents keep happening in the theatre, particularly to the Queen of the Night. Is Viktor truly ready to intervene and save his mother before it's too late?

A witty and hilarious middle-grade series about retired people fighting crime.


In a small-town school a boy sits in a class room, deep in thought. He's called Patrik, and today will be the most exciting day of his life, although he doesn't know it yet.

The series includes six books: Patrik and The Senior Squad (2010), Irene and the Moneyhoover (2013), Fake Bernice (2015), The Fantastic Alfredo (2016), Rakel's Miracles (2017) and The Magnificent Senior Match (2020).

The Senior Squad series has been praised for its crazy humor, quirky characters and action-filled plots that are perfect for young readers. The fourth novel of the series, *The Fantastic Alfredo*, was awarded with Runeberg Junior Prize in 2017.

Malin Klingenberg (b. 1979) is a Swedish-speaking author from Finland who has written six books of The Senior Squad series. In 2018 Klingenberg published her first young adult title, *Elk Girl*, that has received wide critical acclaim. In 2019 Klingenberg came out with a rhyming book *The Secret Life of Farts*, illustrated by Sanna Mander.


In fact, Lenna and her best friend Jaan have just the right amount of fun and excitement—until the supply of fresh water begins to run out.
