

Mannerheim, Marshal of Finland – Life in Geopolitics

How the scion of an aristocratic family became a Russian imperial officer, spy – and leader of the Finnish republic?

Gustaf Mannerheim (1867–1951) is the most distinguished and controversial figure of 20th-century Finland. He was a soldier, strategist and statesman who was at home on the playing field of international politics.

After a wild youth, this scion of a Swedish-speaking aristocratic family went to seek his fortune in St. Petersburg, capital of the Russian empire. There he rose to the rank of a cavalry officer and entered the glittering, cosmopolitan crème de la crème of St. Petersburg.

After the Russian and Japanese Wars, Mannerheim led an espionage expedition on a two-year, 14,000km journey to China. After his return his career in the imperial army rapidly reached its zenith.

In the revolution that followed the First World War, the Russian empire crumbled beneath the imperial officer. Mannerheim returned to Finland. He commanded the White troops in the Finnish Civil War of 1918 and the Finnish army in the Second World War against the Soviet Union. The wars and his short precidency sealed Mannerheim's position in the national pantheon.

In the concise biography of Mannerheim the extraordinary events of his life and his strategic vision are set in the broader framework of the superpower politics of the era and the development of Europe.



René Nyberg (b. 1946) worked from 1971 to 2004 in the Foreign Ministry of Finland. He is Finland's former ambassador to Moscow and Berlin. 1992–1995 he worked as the head of Finland's CSCE delegation. The story of Nyberg's Jewish family's fates, *Last Train to Moscow* (2015), was published to a wide critical acclaim. His latest book *Patriachs and Oligarchs* (2019) tells about the recent history between Finland and Russia through the two forces behind Vladimir Putin—the Orthodox patriarchs and the moneybag oligarchs.

Patriarchs and Oligarchs

Unique overview of modern Russia's power system and the terrible ballast of history.

Patriarchs and Oligarchs by René Nyberg, a Russia expert with a long career in the Finnish diplomatic service, is a fascinating account not only of the recent history of the relations between Finland and Russia, but also of the contemporary reality of the USSR/Russian Federation. Nyberg explores Russia through two of Putin's powerful background supporters and fellow players—the Orthodox clergy and the oligarchs.

The book gives answers to the questions that characterize the close relations between Russia and Finland: how the brutal charm of the Soviet Union once influenced Finland, why the Finnish Lutheran Church began discussions of doctrine with the Orthodox Church of the atheist Soviet Union, and how Russia shot itself in the foot by blocking timber exports to Finland.

The reader gets a behind-the-scenes view through a diplomat's eyes, as Nyberg is personally acquainted with many of the key figures in the book. He is able to provide first-hand information on such questions as why billionaire oligarch Roman Abramovich was interested in Finland, and why Mikhail Khodorkovsky, who challenged Vladimir Putin and suffered a long term of imprisonment, made two visits to the country.

Nyberg's book, which has gathered excellent reviews, has been printed in four print-runs in the space of three months.

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Last Train to Moscow

A family story of forbidden love in 1930s Finland and a survival story of a Latvian Jew, escaping the Nazis and ending up a German citizen.

When René Nyberg, now Finland's former ambassador to Berlin and Moscow, was a teenager, he learned a well-kept family secret. His mother Fanny was a Jew, shunned and ostracized by her family and the Jewish community for marrying a Christian man in 1937.

Later he learned also the story of Fanny's cousin Mascha from Riga, Latvia, who managed barely to escape the advancing Germans in June 1941 with her husband by taking the last train to Moscow. They ended up in Kazakhstan and survived, while all their relatives in Riga were murdered.

Last Train to Moscow takes the reader to pre- and postwar settings in the Baltic states and Finland but also to Belarus, Soviet Union, Germany and Israel. It tells the story of a woman who has to give up her religion, family and friends for love, and of another who survives the war and ends up dying as a German citizen. The stories of them expand into a European panorama of Jewish fates.



The Rough Road to Raate

What was the bloodbath in the Arctic wilderness like for the rank-and file fighters on the Finnish and Soviet lines?

The world's military history bursts at the seams with torrid battle zones, muddy fields, ruined cities and jungles. But there has only been one unique major battle fought on a country by-road amid icy forest and miserable swamps, waist deep in snow, in the long and dark winter night lit by the moonlight of icy expanses.

On the Raate Road in northern Finland the Finns besieged and slaughtered two heavily armed and overwhelming Soviet divisions during the Winter War (1939–1940), one the most chilling legends of wwII. Travelling on skis, the Finns attacked the Red Army's numerical superiority, its convoys of lorries and tanks, with an unusual strategy. The world was watching.

The Raate Road operations were later used for instruction at military training establishments around the world.

In *The Rough Road to Raate*, the award-winning Finnish historian Teemu Keskisarja depicts the immense chaos of a major battle in which the leading roles were played not by military commanders but by ordinary men struggling in a "frozen hell".

The Angel of Death – The Story of the People of the Great Northern War

Big narrative of common people and their fortunes and misfortunes in the turbulence of a major conflict.

A general, a priest, an insurgent chieftain, an executioner and a rank-and-file soldier experienced total war when the northern superpower Sweden defended its supremacy, and a major conflict in Europe was unleashed that would last for over two decades. The war tossed the soldiers about in hunger marches, campaigns of torture, plague-ridden sieges, mountain blizzards and fierce battles from Finland, Sweden and the Baltics all the way to Russia and Norway.

The Angel of Death, by one of Finland's best-known and best-selling historians, tells the stories of people who lived during the Great Northern War that raged from 1700 to 1721: ordinary folk, middle-ranking individuals and major figures. From everyday details like how to get hold of spirits, military desertion and the lack of boots the narrative moves on to the big questions: How did people cope in those days without losing their reason? What drove the people of the eighteenth century—people like the rank-and-file soldier or the crowned head who led the troops?



The Seventh Zone

A vivid maritime history of the Baltic Sea.

According to the Alexandrian geographer Claudius Ptolemy (ca. 150 A.D.), the known world was divided into seven climatic zones. In the North was the seventh zone, the Baltic world, with its icy climate, sea monsters, darkness and frozen seas.


The Seventh Zone: A Maritime History of the Northern Seas 1200–1600 is a broad survey of the maritime history of the Baltic world, especially around The Gulf of Finland, from the 13th to the 17th century. What sort of ships were used in seafaring along the Baltic Sea? How did the ships reach their destinations without maps and lighthouses? What was the role of the 'false lights' to lure the ships? How were shipwrecks and their cargo treated? How did Mikael Agricola advise seafarers in his Prayer Book?

The book ranges from the Middle Ages until the beginning of 'The Era of Great Power' in the history of the Swedish Empire. During the mediaeval period, the Hanseatic League with Lübeck at its helm controlled the Baltic trade. Its influence lessened in the early 16th century, when Sweden became a centralised seafaring state led by the Wasa dynasty. At the time, the largest war ships in the continent were built in Sweden. Philip II of Spain became interested in Nordic galley building and natural forest reserves. For the first time the remote forests of Finland were linked with global trade and numerous wars: European armadas wouldn't have been built without the timber from Finnish forests.

The book is based on wide research of primary sources. Extensive illustrations complement the clear writing style.

Why is Greenland "green"? What happened when the Thames froze over?


And how did the divine winds that sank Kublai Khan's fleet reappear in the Second World War? To conquer the world you need more than the back-up of the world's strongest army or the biggest financial power: you need to rule the weather. None of the past empires have been able to do that—on the contrary, weather has caused many of them to decline or fall.

Russian winter halted the offensives of Charles XII of Sweden, Napoleon, and Hitler. A storm defeated the Spanish Armada. The Little Ice Age plunged Europe into chaos. The El Niño phenomenon speeded the collapse of the Mayan civilization. And what do you think happened with the Neanderthals?

The Weather that Changed the World is narrative nonfiction at its best. Science journalist Marcus Rosenlund takes readers through millennia revealing how weather has shaped our world and our history into what it is today.

The author was awarded for the work by the Society of Swedish Literature in Finland, and it received the State Award for Information Publication 2019.

Lea Pakkanen (b. 1983) is a journalist who has reported on conflicts in Colombia, Israel, Palestine and Myanmar, among others. Santeri Pakkanen (b. 1950) is a journalist who worked actively to revive Ingrian Finnish culture during the Soviet period. The Pakkanens came to Finland in 1990 as returnees from Russia, and in recent years have actively worked to throw light on the fate of the Ingrian Finns, one part of this work being *It Happened to Us* (2020), awarded as the best history book of the year. With photographer Meeri Koutaniemi they have put together an exhibition on Ingrian Finnish identity and collective remembrance at the National Museum of Finland.

It Happened to Us

A father and daughter's journey into the nightmares of their family in the Soviet Union during the twentieth century.

In Lea Pakkanen's childhood the story of her grandmother's exile to Yakutia in Siberia, where she caught fish in the Arctic Ocean with her bare hands, seemed to her like an unbelievable fairy tale.

Lea's grandmother was an Ingrian Finn – a member of the Finnish minority that lived in the Soviet Union. Stalin's persecutions wiped out minorities and dissidents, and by the end of the 1940s the Ingrian Finns had been decimated by deportations, executions and prison camps. The fate of the people who survived became a taboo that could not be discussed until the end of the Soviet Union.

It Happened to Us describes the journey of Lea and her father Santeri to the places where their own family experienced the horrors of the persecutions. Father and daughter follow in the footsteps of a grandmother exiled by riverboat to Yakutia on the shores of the Arctic Ocean. They trace the fate of a grandfather, who ended up in the infamous Gulag in Northern Siberia. Eventually their journey takes them to the suburbs of St. Petersburg, where Russified neighbourhoods stand on the site of mostly purged Ingrian villages.

During their travels, Lea and Santeri look back also at their own journey from the post-Stalin era Soviet Union to modern day Finland. The cracks in Soviet totalitarianism that appeared in the 1980s allowed for a short Ingrian revival, which was cut short when most moved as returnees to Finland, a country that no longer remembered them.

It Happened to Us fills in the history that was silenced, but also makes accurate observations on the relation between state and identity, the role of minorities in national history narratives, and the importance of remembering and forgetting in families.

They Were Nazis

A book about the most terrifying mystery of the 20th century: how could my own family be involved in the Holocaust?

After the horrors of the First World War the future that before had seemed happy and clear for the Baltic German family Baer took a new direction. The family's fate became closely intertwined with the growing National Socialist movement in Germany.

In her acclaimed book journalist Katarina Baer tells the story of her grandparents, an ordinary Baltic German family in the beginning of the 20th century. She describes the life in the Baltic regions as it was during the years of the Russian empire, German colonies scattered throughout the area; the First World War, which stripped the privileged family of their posessions; the life during the war in Berlin, in an apartment taken from Jews; her grandfather, an active and idealist Nazi, and her grandmother, secretly a Nazi till the end of her days.

They Were Nazis is a masterful example of the best narrative nonfiction: a book based on thorough research but still a page-turner. It has gotten glowing reviews and it won the Book of the Year award in Bonnier's Competition for Grand Journalism Prize 2016.



Mikko Pyhälä (b. 1945) is an Ambassador Emeritus and writer of nonfiction. He is the author, with Jukka Salo, of the Finlandia Prize winning book *Amazonia* (1991), a study of the history and natural environment of the Amazon Basin. From 1972 to 2013 Pyhälä was posted at the Finnish Ministry of Foreign Affairs, working part of the time on the United Nations Environment Program. In addition to focusing on Latin America, in his work he has made close studies of conflicts in Vietnam, Afghanistan, Sri Lanka, India, Tibet and Portugal's African colonies. He holds honorary doctorates and professorships at several Latin American universities. His latest book, *Venezuela from Riches to Rags*, came out in the autumn of 2019.

Venezuela from Riches to Rags – Struggle for the Rule of Law

A unique closeup of the Venezuelan crisis by a Finnish Ambassador and award-winning author.

In 2018 Venezuela emerged on the world stage. There was a serious humanitarian crisis in the country, which had driven millions of people into exile and had been allowed to develop for a long time.

During his term in office President Hugo Chávez squandered an enormous amount of the state's wealth and put the country into debt. Alongside the autocratic system there was widespread corruption, which also involved foreign powers. Cuba became a major player.

President Nicolas Maduro drove the Venezuelan people into misery. There was an explosion of human rights abuses and drug trafficking, and Russian oligarchs gained access to the riches of the Venezuelan state. Shortages of food, electricity and medicines fuelled opposition protests, and violence escalated. The crisis was exacerbated by the ongoing power struggle between Maduro, supported by Russia and China, and Parliament speaker Juan Guaidó, backed by the United States.

Venezuela from Riches to Rags is a unique overview of the current situation in Venezuela and the developments that have led to it, seen from an international perspective. Its author, Mikko Pyhälä, worked in Venezuela as Finnish Ambassador from 2006 to 2013 and saw at first hand how an incompetent administration and an enormous waste of resources led to the collapse of the Venezuelan state.

The Enchantment of Propaganda

Why are myths and fake news attractive to millions of people – and how come are the architects of propaganda always one step ahead?

After the end of the Cold War and the fall of the USSR, the world welcomed a new era full of hope. More and more countries became democratic, and political propaganda seemed to sink into oblivion along with the authoritarian regimes.


The 21st century quickly proved that nothing had changed. The Iraq War, the Ukrainian crisis, the rise of Is1s and the presidencies of Trump and Putin put propaganda back into the center of global politics. It turned out that western democracies were not immune to it either—quite the opposite.

The Enchantment of Propaganda: One Hundred Years of Spin Doctoring is a narrative account of propaganda in international politics from 1914 to the present day. Despite this outsized influence, 'Ndrangheta is a surprisingly unknown criminal force. To the inhabitants of southern Italy, however, the organisation is a familiar presence. Locals trust it to look after their best interests better than their regional leaders, the police or even the Italian state.

Author Anton Monti has examined the 'Ndrangheta for years. In this uniquely comprehensive presentation of the syndicate, Monti describes how the organisation's strict code of conduct, religious imagery and cult-like rituals have turned it into a violent moneymaking machine. Before they know it, readers are caught up in this gripping story, where fact is more shocking than fiction.

The Greatest Leap Forward

China uses the latest technology to monitor the lives, actions and thoughts of its citizens ever more closely.

The Chinese leadership keeps watch on its citizens with advanced, intimidatingly effective surveillance technology. Combined with the dictatorship's ability to rapidly mobilise vast operations in the streets and cities, this means near-total surveillance is already possible.

The Greatest Leap Forward is a book by journalist Katarina Baer and photographer Kalle Koponen that describes the massive operations and increasingly total systems China has created to control and manipulate its citizens, and how it manages to keep 1.4 billion people inside its own bubble, unable to access the internet freely.

The authors follow the lives of three Shanghai residents during the corona spring of 2020: Julia, in her last year at school, together with her family; Xu, a barber, and Chunheng, a tourism entrepreneur. All of them are firm supporters of the Chinese Communist Party. Through their stories, the book tries find out why so many Chinese people, despite the repressive measures, are happy with the leadership of their country.

One of the most troubling questions raised in the book is what will happen if the use of Chinese surveillance systems becomes more widespread. The combination of robust surveillance technology and the use of digital big data collected from people would upset the balance of power between dictatorships and democracies and threaten the very foundations of personal privacy.

They are never used together in Japanese literature, poetry or aesthetic concepts, although one often sees them mentioned in tandem in western references. Wabi and sabi are nevertheless linked by an undertone of mournfulness and melancholy. A feeling of loneliness and the need to withdraw from society are seen as positive things to strive for. [...] Both concepts describe the state of the heart and mind: Wabi speaks of a humble and penitent heart and an appreciation of life as it is. Sabi indicates a mind and soul full of serenity."

A keen-eyed author spares neither herself nor the reader in this volume of surprising essays.

"Life is a journey, they say. What a lousy metaphor. After all, life's fundamental nature is stasis, repetition, routine. Life is weekday mornings, the dip in the sofa, taking out the compost, and what should we have for dinner. Maybe life is a journey for Bedouins, but not otherwise. A journey is a journey."

Silvia Hosseini's second volume of essays leads the reader on a meandering expedition from joy to sorrow, from beauty to dread. Drawing from literature, history, and the author's own experiences, the collection masterfully addresses the various transitions, assertions, and losses of the three titular themes through contemporary phenomena. The thinking is sharp, the expression beautiful.

In the essays, knowledge of culture and history combine in fresh insights and self-deprecation. The impact of Arab philosophy on Western civilization is examined through Sicily and Inspector Montalbano. In her essay on the Beat authors, Hosseini objects to the re-evaluation of old works of art on the basis of their worldview. Contemporary feminism comes under fire for being ideological and memeified. And in an essay on birds, Hosseini ponders the role of birds as symbols of life and messengers of death, as in the present day, when the vanishing of bird species predicts devastating ecological catastrophe.

Hosseini's voice is strong, and the compilation an unapologetic literary cornucopia. *Way, Truth, and Death* was nominated for the Toisinkoinen Literary Prize.

Ellen Thesleff (1869–1954) was an internationally significant Finnish artist and one of Finland's first expressionist painters.

She was a trailblazer that cleared the way for future women artists at a time when it was difficult to gain recognition for their work in the male-dominated art world. Like her sisters Gerda and Thyra, Thesleff was an emancipated woman; each made a living in her own independent profession. Defying the era's gender norms, she cut her hair short and began to dress in men's clothing with a tie around her neck.

In the skilful hands of art historian Schreck, the different phases of Ellen Thesleff's life and work come to life. The book describes the artist's cosmopolitan adventures, just as at home in Paris and Florence as in Finland, and tells of her eye-opening experiences in the throbbing pulse of the European modern age. The reader joins a lively and engaging conversation between Thesleff and the narrator of the book, friends speaking to each other from across the decades.




