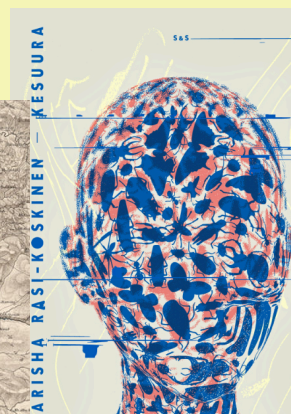
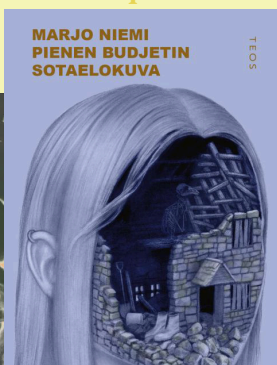
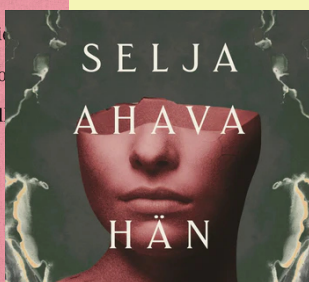

Helsinki Literary Agency offers publishers around the world a broad selection of the best Finnish fiction, nonfiction, and children's literature. Founded in 2017, the agency is a joint venture of three Finnish publishing houses: Gummerus, Schildts & Söderströms and Siltala. The agency represents a wide range of prominent, award-winning authors and illustrators with books both in Finnish and Swedish.

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GUMMERUS
Gummerus, founded in 1872, is Finland's third largest trade publisher with a list of 200 titles each year. It is owned by Swedish Storytel.

SCHILDTS & SÖDERSTRÖMS
Schildts & Söderströms is Finland's largest Swedish language publisher with a history dating back 1891. Its imprint S&S publishes books in Finnish.

SILTALA PUBLISHING
Siltala, founded in 2008, publishes about 40 titles a year. Its list includes both literary fiction and nonfiction.

TEOS PUBLISHERS
Teos Publishers, founded in 2003, publishes about 45 new titles annually. The focus is on literary fiction, but the list includes also nonfiction and children's titles. Since 2024, Teos is owned by Siltala Publishing.

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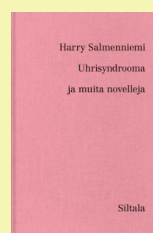
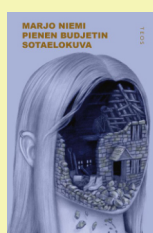
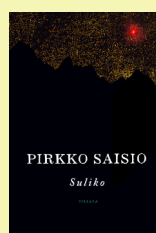
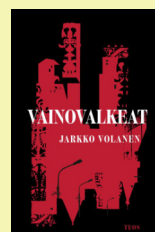

A masterful exploration of humanness through the eyes of the other.

It's an abandoned railway station that nobody has visited in decades. Fells are looming in the horizon, and the sun never sets. An android called QED doesn't know why they are there. The human has brought them to the station. Are they running away, or are they searching for something?

The human doesn't talk much, except demanding that QED writes down all the memories on paper. And so QED writes: about its childhood and parents, about their life in the Forest-Northwest, its animals and insects; about the school, and other schoolmates. The further the writing goes, the harder it becomes to remember. There is one name that only brings radiating pain instead of memories. Has someone tampered with QED's recollections?

Caesura is an immersive and haunting exploration of mind, pain, and compassion, a study of what constitutes being a human. Drawing comparisons to Kazuo Ishiguro's *Klara and the Sun*, Rasi-Koskinen's new novel encourages the reader to ask: am I human enough?

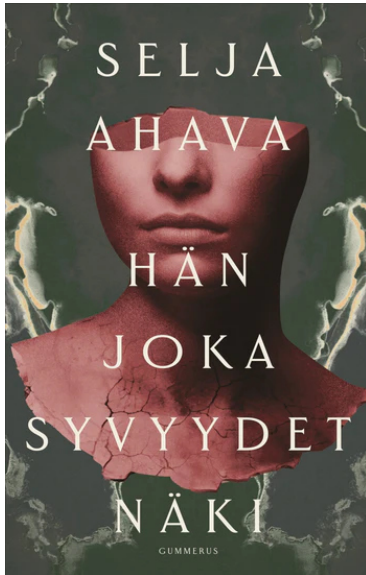
Marisha Rasi-Koskinen (b. 1975) has established herself as one of the most original contemporary authors in Finland, exploring and expanding the limits of fiction and the conscious. She has been awarded the prestigious Runeberg Prize and the Torch-Bearer Prize for her novel *REC* (2020). *Caesura* is her sixth work for adult readers. She has also written two novels for young adults – *The Dark Side of the Sun* (2019) and *The Fallen* (2022) – winning the Finlandia Junior Prize, the most important literary award in Finland for children's and youth fiction, for the former.

An enchanting rhapsody about love in the face of mortality.

Liisa and Henrik are a middle-aged couple who share a great love, but also a great fear: having met later in life, they grapple all too often with the fact that the time they get to share may not be so long after all.

While Henrik is away at sea, Liisa's aunt, her only relative who has gotten to live to old age, falls deathly ill. Liisa decides to deal with the looming fear the way she knows best: by telling a story.

Comprising various narratives, from exploration of the *Epic of Gilgamesh* to a life of an eight-year-old who is declared brain-dead but whose mother refuses to turn off her ventilator for years, it is an account on pursuing immortality the only way mankind can: by putting together something greater than themselves and consigning it to history. The result is a moving, ambitious rhapsody about love and death that weaves together multiple stories, myths, and tales.

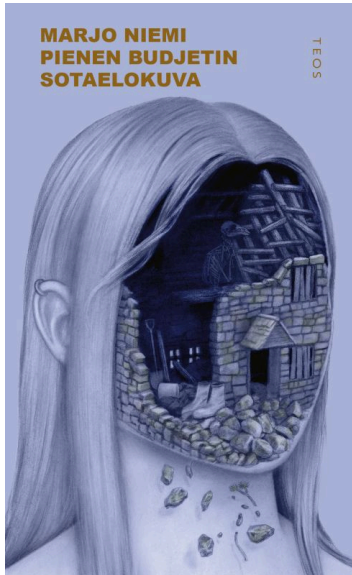
Selja Ahava (b. 1974) has established herself as a prominent literary voice in the Finnish scene. Her second novel, *Things that Fall from the Sky* (2015) was awarded the European Union Prize for Literature in 2016, and it was nominated for the Finlandia Prize, the Torch-Bearer Prize, the Warwick Prize and the Dublin Literary Award and was sold to 27 territories. The previous novel, *The Woman Who Loved Insects* (2020), was nominated for the prestigious Runeberg Prize. Ahava is among the most appreciated authors in Finland by both the general public and the critics. *He Who Saw the Deep* (2025) is her fifth novel.

“Each of us is ashamed of who we are, individually and collectively. We each wallow in our own shame.”

They say it’s a country of equal opportunities. The narrator, who has long ago escaped to a big city, returns to her hometown after her father’s death. The town factory once offered the residents not only work and a livelihood, but also housing, school, daycare, healthcare, and hobbies. All that is left here now is a burned-down shopping centre and angst.

The narrator reflects on her childhood, and gradually the adult and the child in her become intertwined. She is defined by the experience of an outsider: she does not recognize the old class as her own, and the new class does not recognize her as one of its own. The self-help instructions of positive thinking sound like cruel optimism: Don’t you have all the opportunities to succeed? Why don’t you take advantage of them? You only have yourself to blame!

A Low-Budget War Film is not one of those working-class novels in which the spirit of the united grows into a collective force. Rather, with its ruthless directness and dark humor, the novel shows how class identity is fragmented into individual pursuits, and the shame is inherited throughout generations.

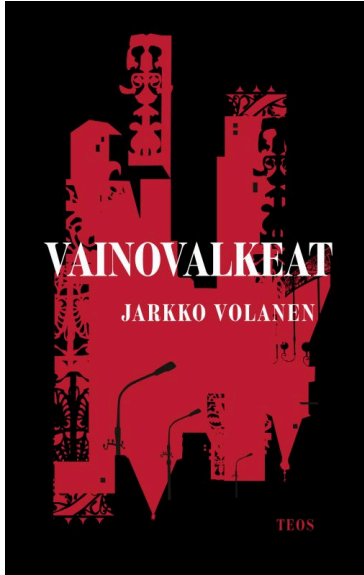
Marjo Niemi (b. 1978) is a Helsinki-based writer, playwright and director. *A Low-Budget War Film* is her sixth novel. She was awarded the prestigious Runeberg Prize for *The Mother of All Losses* (2017), and her previous novel, *Hearing* (2021), was a nominee for the Finlandia Prize. Among the most prominent themes in Niemi’s prose are questions of who gets to be heard, seen, and noticed, often punctuated with pungent, dark humor.

A deeply emotional novel about terror, fictional identities, and the love that binds people together.

After a long time, brothers Viktor and Valdemar meet each other again. Valdemar is a dutiful and submissive state official; Viktor has just been released from prison. The past has left a mark, but their childhood is still shrouded in a mist. Why did they grow up with their grandparents, in almost military discipline? The truth may no longer be within reach, or if it is, its price may be too high.

Anna and Elena are a couple who together raise a little boy. Every moment of every day they fear that their relationship will be exposed, and the child will be taken away from them. Anna's work in an organization that tries to help those persecuted by the state only increases the danger. When she meets Valdemar, who asks to help his brother, the two of them begin to develop a risky plan.

Signal Fires portrays a life in a society where suspicion is a civic duty, love is a crime, and every friendly gesture may turn out to be a trap. The characters' fates intertwine in fear: not a passing worry, but a continuous, built-in state of mind. The story reads almost like a thriller, but Volanen's narration isn't screaming special effects and cliff-hangers; rather, it's a through-through whisper, underscoring the many parallels to the world we live in today and leaving the reader in chills.

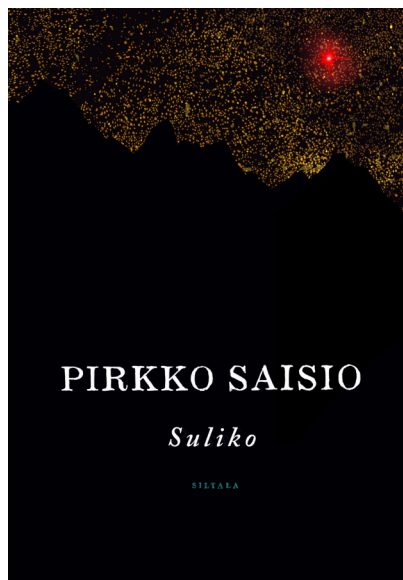

On a cold New Year's night, a downhearted autocrat is lost in his memories. He has ashes in his throat and longs for the mountain sun, for his youth. His dreams are confused and distressing, his submissive subjects are repulsive, and everyday events seem strange. What's going on? Only Suliko can calm the anxious old man. It is to Suliko the mighty man turns in his thoughts and soliloquies.

The novel slips into flashbacks: childhood and youth, the years of manhood and strength. Scenes and situations in which the determined protagonist has been faced with choices, choices that have led to new ones. But does even the strong-minded man ultimately have free will?

Suliko reaches into the world of myths and asks in what situations human choices lead to outcomes opposite to the original ethos and purpose. How does an idealist fighting for justice grow into a dictator? Is love an illusion? And – who is Suliko?

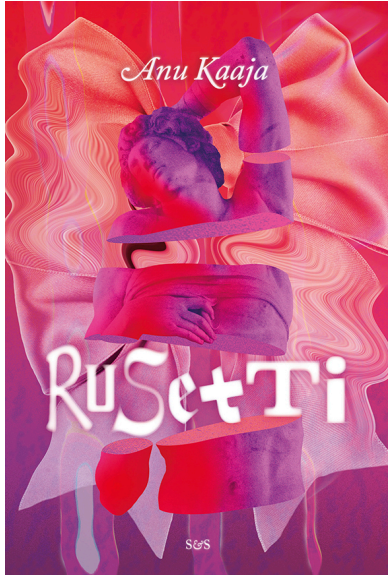

Pirkko Saisio (b. 1949) is an author, theatre director, actor and one of the best-known cultural figures in Finland. Her novel *The Course of Life* (1975) received an award for the best debut of the year. Since then, Saisio has been nominated for the Finlandia Prize seven times, winning it with *The Red Book of Farewells* (2003), the last novel in her auto-fictional trilogy, which marked her breakthrough to the top ranks of Finnish fiction. She has, among other awards, received Aleksis Kivi Prize and State Literature Award.

Anu Kaaja (b. 1984) is an author and scriptwriter who studied creative writing in Helsinki and is a Master of Arts from the University of Salford. Kaaja's debut *Metamorphosis* (2015), a surrealist collection of short stories, came second in the Helsingin Sanomat Literature Prize competition. In 2017 it was awarded the Jarkko Laine Literature Prize. *Leda* (2017) was Kaaja's first novel. It was nominated for the Runeberg Prize and awarded the Toisinkoinen Literature Prize. *Katie-Kate* (2020) was awarded the Kalevi Jäntti Prize and was received with wide critical acclaim. *The Ribbon Bow* (2023) is Kaaja's latest work, a contemporary Grand Tour – and as surprising and quirky as Kaaja's writing always is. It was nominated for the Runeberg Prize and the Adlibris Award.

Heaven is sitting in a hot room full of naked men whipping themselves with a birch branch.

Growing up is hard. Growing into a real man under the watchful eyes of the community in the Finnish countryside is even harder. It's wanting to help your father around and ending up with a toolbox on your foot and a bruised ego; it's trying to keep your first beer down no matter the taste; it's ruling the local sauna with an iron fist even when your body is crying for mercy. Failing to meet the standard results in being labeled as “a weakling”, a title that throws one forever in the ranks of the weak and unreliable.

A Weakling is a collection of novellas about masculinity and growing pains, peppered with sharp humor and an eye for real-life details. The setting is the Ostrobothnia, deep in the Finnish countryside, and it follows the laws of small villages and communities everywhere: both the town eccentric and the bigwigs must get a chance to have their say, and ordinary interactions often take an unexpected turn, opening the door for bizarre and hilarious yet believable outcomes. The social codes are laid bare and must be obeyed at any time: whether it's at the gas station, on the ski slopes, or at home, a real man always knows how to behave. Or maybe not, but trying his best always makes for a good story.

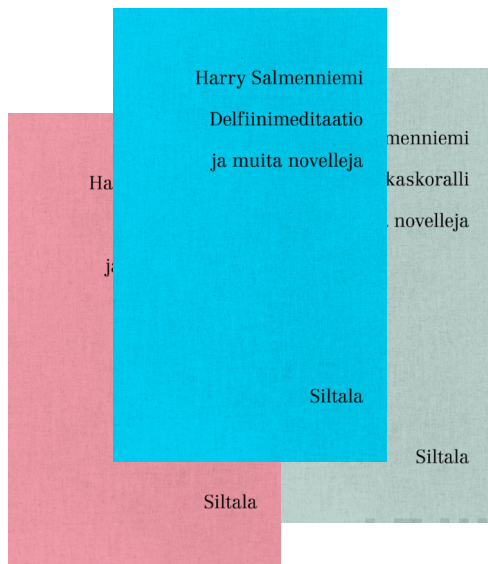
Axel Åhman (b. 1993) is a writer, comedian and journalist. He is the A in the comedy group KAJ that represented Sweden in the 2025 Eurovision Song Contest with the song *Bara bada bastu*. The success of the group made him a household name across Europe and gave his authorship renewed international visibility. Åhman often writes with a tendency towards the tragicomic, but with great warmth for his characters. *A Weakling* (2020) was his literary debut, and his first novel *Enthusiast* was published in 2025. He has also written a middle grade novel *The Smuggler's Treasure* (2024).

An inimitable union of camp overearnestness and deep laughter by Finland's David Foster Wallace.

From a fantastic, never-ending salad recipe to retail chains waging guerilla warfare; from an incoherent and resentful psychiatrist to a footballer with monstrous tendencies towards competition. Awarded and beloved by readers, Harry Salmenniemi's short story collections offer odd, mind-boggling situations, painful satire, and laughable – although never in a way you'd think – characters.

The short stories, published in five volumes between 2017 and 2021, are always intertwining and in conversation with each other, and explore a wide array of timely topics: a crisis of masculinity, the rise of the political right, the sore spots of late capitalism, mental health, meditation, food, children, and love. The themes may be difficult, but the way they are handled is not: above all, the stories are funny, even defiant in their humor in the all-prevalent absurdity of our times.

While Salmenniemi's style has a strong postmodern taste echoing David Foster Wallace's work, it also draws from such literary classics as Laurence Stern and Flann O'Brien, among others. Innovative, unpredictable, diverse in structure and atmosphere, the stories serve as a testimony to the perpetual surprise that the novella form can offer, as well as its undiminished pertinence in the modern literary landscape.

The collections have found a widespread audience in Finland, with several repeated print runs along the years.



Harry Salmenniemi (b. 1983) is one of Finland's most original contemporary writers. He has published seven collections of poetry and was awarded for *Texas, Scissors* (2010) the Kalevi Jäntti Award. His prose debut was the short story collection *The Uranium Lamp* (2017). After that, he has written three other collections of short stories: *Dolphin Meditation* (2019), *Victim Syndrome* (2020), and *Customer Coral* (2021). Salmenniemi has also authored the film script *Tectonic Plate* (2016) and *Failed Emptiness* (2024), both directed by Mika Taanila, and the libretto to chamber opera *Bliss* (2015), which was awarded the Teosto Award. In 2023, he published his first novel *Shadowmind*, and in 2024 a second one, *Heartmist*.

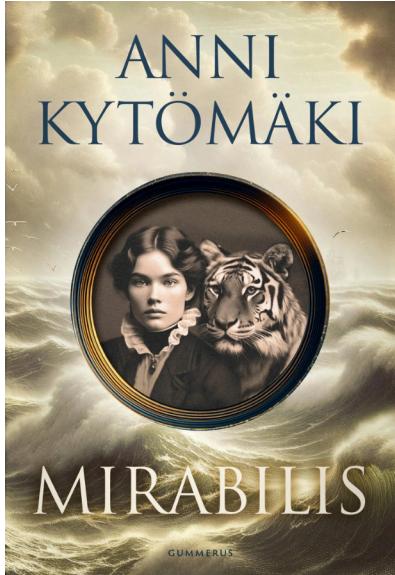

A grand novel about life and death by an award-winning storyteller.

Unusually strong and sturdy, young Riikka survives years of famine and joins a railway track construction site. When a captain comes looking for people to build a new life overseas, Riikka joins the assembly. During the long sea voyage, Riikka gives birth to twins, Artturi and Ella, whose childhood begins in the Amur, in a fading utopian community in north-east Asia. In time, the twins are sent back to their mother's homeland, but Riikka stays behind. She has a close bond with nature, and an Amur tiger leaves a lasting impression on her. Back in Finland, the twins become acrobatic gymnasts. After tragic accidents, Ella is able to find solace only in her body's capacity to twist, turn and endure. Not unlike her mother, she identifies with the recently extinct spectacled cormorant.

Set at the turn of the 19th and 20th centuries, *Mirabilis* describes the transformation of worldview when natural science showed that man is not, after all, the crown of creation. The fates of humans and animals intertwine with a thriller-like intensity. Through the stories of outsider mother and daughter, the relationship between nature and man is explored in terms of domination, assimilation, corporeality and transformation. Kytömäki's particular storytelling skills result in world-class literature, where the magic of narration sinks deep into the mind and makes one see the fragility and power of nature with new eyes.

The world needs not only explanations but also something miraculous.

Anni Kytömäki (b. 1980) trained as a nature surveyor. Her debut novel *Goldheart* (2015) was nominated for the Finlandia Prize and Helsingin Sanomat Literature Prize, and received the Kaarle Prize, Tampere City Literature Prize and Torch-Bearer Prize, given to the Finnish title with the most potential to succeed abroad. In 2017, Kytömäki published the bestselling and critically acclaimed *Stone Weaver*, once more awarded the Tampere City Literature Prize. Her third novel, *Margarita* (2020), was the recipient of the biggest literary prize in Finland, the Finlandia.

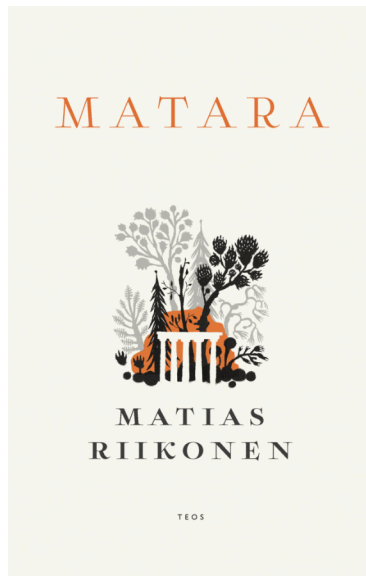

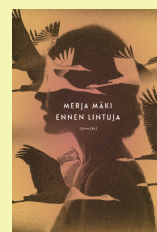

The Adel Sisters trilogy follows three talented and charming sisters in the early 1900s Finland and on their travels in Europe as they try to find their way in male dominated fields of art and science.

The sisters live with their painter father Axel and mother Matilda in a beautiful Casa Adel in Naantali, southwestern Finland. The family has an aristocratic background, but have been impoverished due to unfortunate events. The oldest daughter, Thyra, is an introverted soul focused on mathematics and astronomy. Middle child Lily loves art and aspires to become a painter like her beloved father. The youngest, Kitty, spends her days roaming about forests and lakes and dreams of becoming an archaeologist.

In addition to complicated matters of the heart, the reader gets swept up in the cultural and spiritual movements of the era that influenced art and science alike. Antell paints a vivid picture of a time when women were active and committed figures in many fields, although repeatedly overshadowed by men.

In *White Lily* (2025), the middle child of the Adel family, Lily, gets to accompany her eccentric grandmother on a summer visit in Florence where she gets to further her studies and see the art treasures of the city. It's the 1910s, and modern art is just starting to get a foothold in Europe. In Florence, she meets a fetching Italian art patron and an enigmatic Swedish painter who inspire her to discover art, aesthetics, spirituality – and herself. There is no going back to her old life.

Their cranky recluse of an uncle conducts scientific experiments in the courtyard building and studies stars. Thyra succeeds in gaining his trust. After noticing his niece's talent, the uncle sends her to study at Uppsala University, where Thyra loses her heart. But is the man truly right for her?

In *Wild Bird* (2027), Kitty, the youngest of the Adel sisters studies nature sciences in the University of Helsinki. She spends her free time at their grandmother's summer cottage studying and collecting plants, insects and animals. After graduation, Kitty receives a scholarship and travels to Greece to study the country's flora and meets a charming Professor and a fisherman. Kitty falls in love with Greece, but which is more important to her: a career in research, or love?

Cotton Mill trilogy has all a reader hungry for romance can wish for. There are strong-willed women, overbearing, yet irresistible men, huge historical movements providing the background and, naturally, complications and resolutions of the human affairs.

While getting thrown into the sprouting love-affairs the reader gets taken also to a time trip from the 1880s' Grand Duchy of Finland to the oppression years at the turn of the century, and finally to the first years of Finnish independence. As a setting, the cotton mill provides a great view to the process of industrialization but also to the process of women gaining a strong foothold in society – and in business.

In *The Shadow of the Cotton Mill* (2021), it's the sunset of the 19th century in Finland, then an autonomous area of the Russian empire. In the city of Turku, the young widow Jenny Malmström devotes her energies to improving the status of women and the living conditions of factory workers. Doing this, she is set up against Fredrik Barker, the arrogant son of a cotton mill owner, who seems to represent everything Jenny is fighting against. But all of the sudden Jenny finds herself between a rock and a hard place: should she listen to her principles – or her heart?

In *Heir to the Cotton Mill* (2022) it is the dawn of the 20th century. Jenny's adult foster daughter, Martta, returns from Sweden to her childhood home, Turku. The new director of the cotton mill, the agreeable dandy Robert, introduces Martta to Turku society, while Juho, a childhood

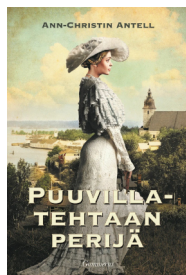

Merja Mäki's heart-wrenching novels set in wartime Finland capture the coming of age stories of three different young women in impossible conditions. Addressing the themes of family relationships, displacement, life choices, prejudice, love and forgiveness, the novels give a new view to the much-written-about Finnish war experience. The three standalone novels share some common characters but are set in different time and place.

In *Before the Birds* (2022), it's February 1940 in Finland's eastern province of Karelia. Alli flees the bombing of Sortavala and skis across frozen Lake Ladoga to the island where she was raised. She has two wishes: to escape the war and to follow in her father's footsteps and become a fisherman despite her mother's firm resistance.

But life does not respect Alli's wishes. The Winter War ends in a heavily bought peace that cedes much of Alli's beloved Finnish Karelia to the Soviet Union. She must leave her home behind and embark on an onerous trek across the new border. When she reaches her new Finnish home, she must endure alms from her father's kin, unfamiliar customs, and her work at a military hospital

Back in Karelia, only empty shores await the migrating birds. Can a fisherman's daughter accustomed to the crashing waves and incessant winds of Lake Ladoga lay down roots amid the flat expanses of Ostrobothnia? And what makes a place home – love for others or familiar landscapes? friend who works at the shipyards, also appeals to her with his rough-hewn charms. As a



Merja Mäki (b. 1983) worked as a teacher of Finnish before embarking on her author career. She published seven books for children and young adults before writing her first novel, *Before the Birds* (2022), which was an instant critical and commercial success. In *Wept Another* (2024), It is the summer of 1942 and Larja returns to her home to Aunus Karelia from teacher training camp. Peace has momentarily descended on this bit of territory recently reclaimed from the Soviets by Finnish troops.

Upon her arrival, Larja soon learns that her buabo Matja, the village's most respected professional lamenter, is deathly ill, and her little sister Pola carries a secret deep within her heart. Their mother's wild rose bushes bloom near the step and yet the fate of her parents, carted off to a gulag years ago, remains unknown

As Larja cares for her ailing grandmother, she listens to the messages the trees are sending her on the northern winds and discovers that she too has the gift of wailing. However, it requires great courage to accompany the dead to the other side

After a Finnish man steps into her life, Larja finds herself again torn between two different worlds. Still, love knows no borders and the winds blow as they see fit. Can Larja answer the wind's call and weep another day.

Wept Another is the story of a young woman who has grown up between two cultures on the border of two countries. It is a tale of roots and the ties that bind us, but above all, of the choices that you must make in life.

In *When the Light Disappears* (2026), it's 1944 in Seinäjoki, Western Finland. Young Ilmi, Alli's sister, has been forced to leave her home in Laatokka Karelia two times. She is ready to start her own life, but is tied to her mother who is stuck in the past and fatally ill.

Ilmi falls in love with war veteran Antti, who is part of a local religious sect Awakening. The older sect members treat Ilmi suspiciously, seeing her as a Russian. Ilmi wants to get closer to Antti but he resists due to the differences of their religions.

Ilmi helps Antti to transport heavy cargo in horse-drawn carts, often at nighttime. She does not know that there is a major weapon cache operation going on. After the bitter peace and its hard terms, the Finns are afraid that the Soviets will try to invade the whole country and are preparing for a guerilla war by hiding weapons.

New thoughts about joy and freedom are infiltrating the minds of the religious youths and Ilmi starts to find her place in the theatre community. Hope awakens in Ilmi: maybe Antti can belong to her after all. But when Antti is arrested due to his illegal actions, Ilmi gets the blame. She feels forced to leave acting and stick to her mother's death bed. Will she ever get her chance to try her wings and fly?

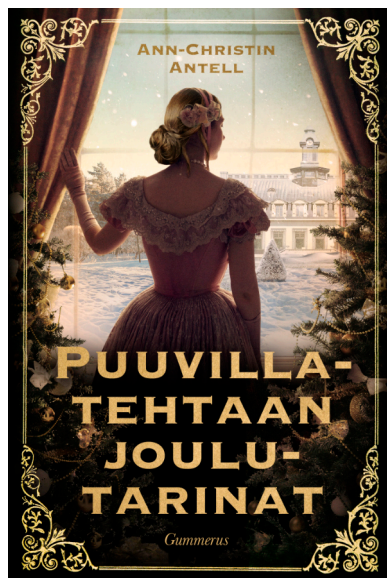

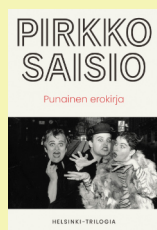
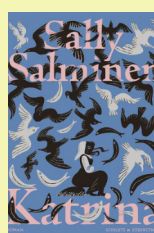

One of the all-time masterpieces of Finnish literature from the working-class writer, queer icon and renaissance artist Saisio.

Pirkko Saisio's autofictional trilogy carries the reader through the childhood, adolescence and adulthood of a girl who wanted to be a boy and started calling herself "her" when she was eight years of age.

The trilogy starts with *The Lowest Common Multiple* (1998). In the beginning of the novel, the main character, "she", is already a middle-aged mother. When her father dies, things get shoved off their place. Her memories take her back to her childhood in the 1950s – to a story, which is also about to change.

In the second novel, *The Backlight* (2000), it is 1968, and the main character is travelling to Switzerland to work in an orphanage. With episodes from her grammar school years, the reader follows her navigating the conflict between a leftist upbringing, Christianity, and her awakening sexuality.

The Red Book of Farewells (2003) starts in the politically turbulent 1970s. The main character begins her studies in the Theatre Academy, falls in love with a woman, and enters an adult life where there are to be farewells every now and then.

The strong themes of the trilogy – the relationship between an individual and the society, sexuality and being queer, and finding your voice – are told in a fragmentary, lyrical style, descriptive of Saisio. As the background, there is Helsinki, changing as the decades go by.



Pirkko Saisio (b. 1949) is an author, theatre director, actor and one of the best-known cultural figures in Finland. Her novel *The Course of Life* (1975) was awarded as the best debut of the year. Since then, Saisio has been nominated for the Finlandia Prize seven times, winning it in with *The Red Book of Farewells* (2003), the last novel in her autofictional trilogy, which marked her breakthrough to the top of Finnish fiction. She has, among other awards, received Aleksis Kivi Prize and State Literature Award. Today, her novels are considered modern classics.

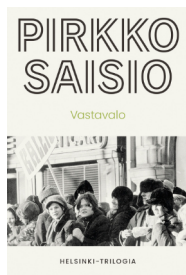

Maja and Janne have moved out to a remote skerry, Stormskär, and are doing their best to make a life for themselves in all the barrenness. But life in the outer archipelago is hard, and sorrows, storms, fires and bad weather constantly interfere with their plans. In the midst of all their endeavours, the love between Maja and Janne lights their way.

Inspired by her own family's experiences on the Åland Islands, the author combines her great knowledge of customs and traditions with impeccable way of bringing to life the inner worlds of her characters, making the series an atmospheric, vivid reflection of times gone by.

Originally published between 1968 and 1973, the series follows Maja for over 50 years. Her life is forever changed when Janne, a fisherman's son, asks for her hand in marriage despite barely knowing her. Young Maja is set to start a new life on the remote skerry, and grows into a strong woman capable of dealing with both the good and the bad that life throws at her. The series, now an established Swedish-language classic, was adapted into a widely successful movie in 2024.

In *The Way to Stormskär* (1968), it's the mid 1800s, and Maja is a young girl living on a farm with her family in Åland. The visit and the proposal of a young fisherman, Janne, take her life in an unexpected direction: in order to survive and thrive away from her community, Maja has to learn more than she ever imagined.

Anni Blomqvist (1909–1990) was born on Vårdö, northeast of the Isle of Åland, and lived there her entire life. She debuted in 1966, and after the success with the books about Maja from Stormskär (1968–1973), Blomqvist wrote several critically acclaimed novels and an autobiographical work about life in the archipelago, past and present. Blomqvist actively took part in social debate throughout most of her life by writing open letters, articles, and columns. Her works are now regarded as modern classics and a unique portrayal of the Åland archipelago.

In *The Sea as a Neighbour* (1969), Maja and Janne start their life on Stormskär and their family grows. Their peace is disrupted when war breaks, but new happiness awaits them.

In *Maja* (1970), Maja's faith and courage are put to a strenuous test. One of Maja's children passes away. Later, when it seems that things are starting to look up, their house is destroyed in a fire just before Christmas. Thankfully Janne's and her family's love have more power than she dared to hope, and even dark clouds have a silver lining.

In *At Battle with the Sea* (1971), Maja's troubles aren't over. As she, Janne, and the children are looking for ways to rebuild their life on the skerry, Maja fears death may be at her heels. Amidst dark thoughts she finds new courage and strength even in the face of the worst of losses.

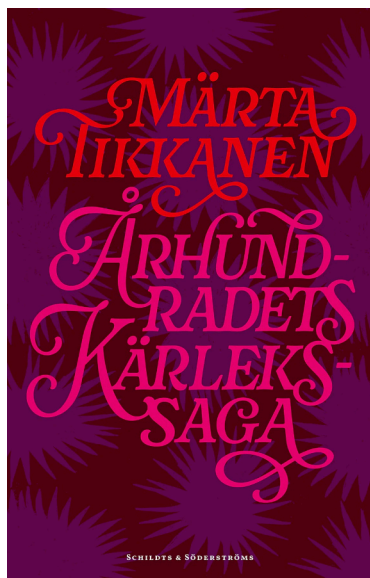

Märta Tikkanen's verse novel *The Love Story of the Century* debuted in 1978 and quickly became an undisputed classic of Finnish literature. At the time, it was revolutionary in its depiction of life with an alcoholic husband, the violence and fear that came with it, and the demands placed on women in the family and the home. But it also depicts the power of love and falling in love, and the creative process as a counterforce to everything that's destructive. Märta Tikkanen (b. 1935) is a Finland-Swedish journalist, writer, and teacher. In her broad output, translated into over 20 languages, she has critically dealt with gender roles and the shackles that bind women, as well as women's liberation and the longing to realize oneself. She became a central figure in the Nordic women's movement with her novel *Manrape* (1975). In 1979, she was awarded the Nordic Women's Alternative Literature Prize and the Finnish Booksellers' Thank You for the Book Prize. In 1983, she was awarded Finland's State Prize for the Dissemination of Knowledge; in 1999, the Swedish literary De Nios Grand Prize; in 2002, the Swedish Academy's Finland Prize; and in 2011, Finland's State Literary Prize.

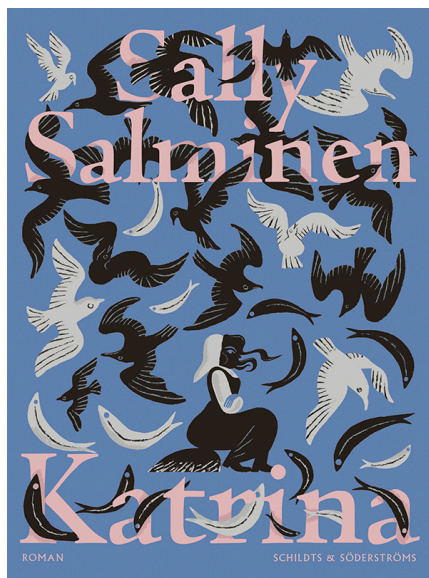

Young Katrina moves from Ostrobothnia to Åland Islands to marry Johan. Johan is a shiftless swindler and liar incapable of finishing anything, even his child's coffin. And yet, Katrina loves him deeply.

Katrina is a progressive woman for her time, and the novel *Katrina* was one of the first in Finland to tell a woman's story from her own perspective. The work depicts life during the early years of Finnish independence in the archipelago of Åland, in all its stark beauty as well as its suspicion of outsiders and turmoil: the political situation of the era is unavoidable in the islands, and criticism of those in power is often present in Katrina's gaze.

Katrina blends multiple genres, including the adventure story, and the narration and even tragic events are often accompanied by a quiet, intelligent humor. The novel's characters – both women and men – are unusually complete and complex: in other words, human.

Katrina was an international success in its day: a novel written in New York in 1936 by the cosmopolitan, Swedish-speaking Finn Sally Salminen. Rights to the work were sold to over 20 countries, and the work has risen to renewed success in Finland thanks to a new translation by Finlandia Prize-winning author Juha Hurme.

Sally Salminen (1906–1976) was the most internationally renowned author from Finland of her time. Born in the Åland Islands, Salminen moved to New York in the 1930s, where she wrote her debut novel *Katrina* (1936). An ode to a woman's strength and stamina, the novel immediately became a phenomenal success, translated into more than 20 languages.



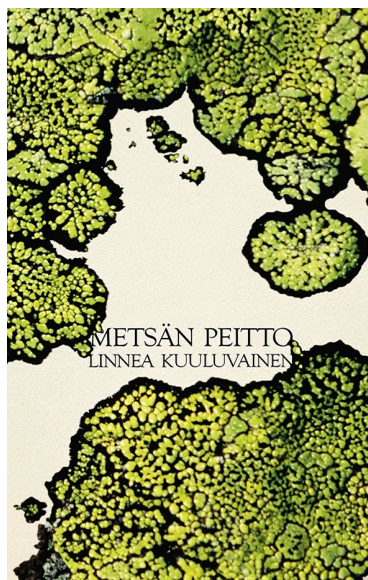

The Eternal Winter series is one of the most anticipated fantasy titles on the Finnish literary scene. The adventure whisks the reader into a complex world that feels real and draws from medieval history, superbly combining mythologies from different regions with the imagined. As the narrative unfolds, themes of loss, identity and the tension between humanity and the supernatural emerge.

In *The Path of Eternal Winter* (2024), it is autumn 1007, and a blue star twinkles above Constantinople. People who have been shivering in the grip of winter for seven years are filled with a sense of foreboding.

When wedding celebrations at the Palace end in bloodshed, Orpheus, a lute player, assumes responsibility for his young niece Halla, who is being chased by a group of mercenaries. The pair embark on a perilous escape, which stops them from trusting anyone.

At the same time in Pavia, the widow Empress Theophanu is trying to trace her son, missing in combat. An emaciated man from the North suffering from amnesia is discovered in a monastery; his story is intertwined with Halla's. Gradually secrets locked behind many doors begin to be revealed – including what has caused eternal winter to descend on the world.



Niilo Sevänen (b.1979) is a singer and bassist in Insomnium, a melodic death metal band. He grew up surrounded by books in Joensuu in east Finland and studied cultural history at Turku University. Before the Eternal Winter series, he published a fantasy novella, *Winter's Gate*, which won the Nova competition in 2007 and was placed fourth in in Atorox, Finland's oldest science fiction competition, in 2009. In 2017, Insomnium issued a concept album, 'Winter's Gate', based on the world of the short story. The short story appeared in a new form in 2023 and immediately became a success as an audiobook.

Old wounds are reopened, loyalties tested, and the shadow of the White Witch looms large.

To save Halla—and perhaps themselves—a daring rescue mission descends into the Underworld, where ancient magic stirs and long-buried truths are revealed. With dreamscapes, mythical beasts, and cursed crowns shaping their journey, the fate of the living and the dead hangs in the balance. Themes of sacrifice, forgiveness, and self-discovery run throughout as the characters find different paths forward: some together, some apart.

Niilo Sevänen masterfully weaves together elements of Norse mythology, Finnish folklore, and medieval history, creating a rich tapestry of adventure, sacrifice, and the unbreakable bonds of family.

A prequel novella, *Winter's Gate* (2007/2023), follows a Viking foray in the 800s, giving background to the events of Eternal Winter.

The Bee Pavilion is a former support center for the psychically ill. It is one of the few old buildings in the city, and also under threat of demolition. It hosts within the shelter of its bricks walls various associations, swarms. These include The Promoters of Municipal Science, The Nasal Twang Speakers, The Society for Water Jet Ski Competition, The Club of Non-Human Persons, The Cynics, The Luddite Club, and the Lipographs. The amateur theater company Heart & Liver and Hecuba's Porno Shop also operated in the Bee Pavilion.

To his own surprise, the narrator of *The Bee Pavilion* joins the Fluctuating Reality Club. He gets to know many of the frequenters of the Bee Pavilion, and also Lahja, the hearing-impaired janitor who battles disorder and entropy daily.

The Bee Pavilion is a building of stories. Strange, surprising, and inexplicable experiences unite the members of the Fluctuating Reality Club.

Anything – even the accumulation of a pile of black dust in a house – can derail a person and make them doubt the permanence of a universal and equal reality. Just meeting someone new is enough for a shift in reality. People start transforming and changing realities as soon as they drift into each other's sphere of influence.

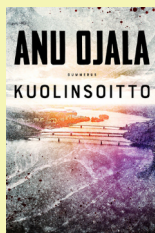


Leena Krohn's (b. 1947) writing forms an impressive body of work. One of the greatest visionaries in Finnish literature, Krohn's works have been translated to over 20 languages.

Anu Ojala (b. 1972) is an author and a lawyer living in Rovaniemi in the Finnish Lapland, with a deep knowledge of the background of the Arctic drug war. She has worked in a law firm and at the University of Lapland. In addition to the Silk Road North series, Ojala has also written young adult novels.

Tangled threads of tricky crimes solved by an imperfect, middle-aged female constable trying to find her way in life.

The series of stand-alone whodunnits present the reader senior constable Anna Glad, who comes across not only crimes but also the very relatable everyday problems of an ordinary woman. With a touch of romance and humour, Eva Frantz has created a heroine whom it is hard not to like.

In the novels, Frantz deals with issues of our social media era: hate speech, grooming, and isolation. The crimes are hideous, but the violence is not excessive, and with the small disasters that keep appearing in Anna Glad's personal life there is a delicate balance between suspense and coziness.

Awarded with the Clew of the Year Award and with sales of so far almost 100,000 copies only in Finland, Anna Glad novels are the top of Finnish crime fiction.

The Blue Villa (2017) starts with a chilling scene, typical of Eva Frantz. Five-year-old Bruno wakes up in the middle of the night to a noise. He goes downstairs to find his mother Becca – but she doesn't wake up. As the investigation takes off, dark and dangerous things from her past start to surface.

In *The Eighth Maiden* (2018), an early morning's winter-swimmer gets the fright of his life when he bumps into something in the ice-cold water. Anna Glad is soon tangled in deeds brought on by the vicious culture of physical abuse which always flourishes around money and power.

Out of the Game (2020) is a jigsaw puzzle of a crime novel: A mother encounters a terrible surprise when she peeps at her baby in the stroller. An elderly opponent of a cycle lane goes missing, leaving behind only bloody tracks. The American wife of a local ice-hockey legend is surrounded by an atmosphere of secrecy. Anna Glad, very late in her first pregnancy, seems to be running out of time to solve all the mysteries.



Eva Frantz (b. 1980) is an author and a journalist at the Finnish national broadcasting company. Frantz debuted with the mystery novel *Summer Isle* in 2016. Since then, she has been working on a crime series about senior constable Anna Glad that has five novels: *The Blue Villa* (2017), *The Eighth Maiden* (2018), which was awarded as the best crime novel of the year and nominated for the Nordic Glass Key Award, *Out of the Game* (2020), *You Will Not Take My Child* (2023) and *Then Die Contentedly* (2024). She has also written internationally recognized middle-grade novels.

In *You Will Not Take My Child* (2023) Anna Glad is trying to get her routines as a mother and a policewoman running. While her partner Tomas seems to be very occupied with the family problems of his new friend Mimmi, Anna Glad needs to put together pieces that don't seem to belong together: where has the school secretary disappeared, why is the sewer in the most popular playground of the town flooding strangely, and is there some hidden art in a building that will soon be pulled down?

In *Then Die Contentedly* (2024) four friends get together for a fancy dinner to have fun. They do, but next morning, only two of them wake up in the house. Anna Glad, taking care of her son while his father is at work, can't resist putting her nose into the case.

Cozy crime meets police procedural in a shamelessly nostalgic whodunnit series set in different seasons in Helsinki.

Meticulous police work and forensic pathology are in focus, balanced with evenings of good food and board games, when the complacent detective Ville Karila and the eccentric medical examiner Viola Kaario come together to solve mysteries. Bound together with an old secret, the duo's strange relationship and zingy chemistry is one of the many puzzles of the books.

In the novels, authentic depictions of real police work come together with cozy settings of different Helsinki locations. Each of the novels takes place during a holiday – be it Christmas, Midsummer or Easter – and hence the reader is immersed into the atmospheric settings and epicurean pleasures of different seasons. Hidden in the stories are not only nods and winks to the works of crime classics but also actual, real crimes that have happened in Finland.

Praised for its complex characters and pleasingly slow pace of events, the series is “modern Maigret” for readers who like their mysteries cozy but credible.

In *The Dead Still Speak* (2021), Karila and Kaario investigate a death of a woman who has been living in thrall to a threatening Casanova. But as a second body turns up, the case turns more complicated. Could a victim be the perpetrator – and the true culprits get away scot-free?

In *Death Comes for the Dead* (2023), the secret Kaario has been keeping from Karila is still gnawing at their friendship – as is her own mission to put a few things straight. But there is also a new case at hand. The roots of a violent death of a man already declared dead a decade before seem to lead to an old tragedy.

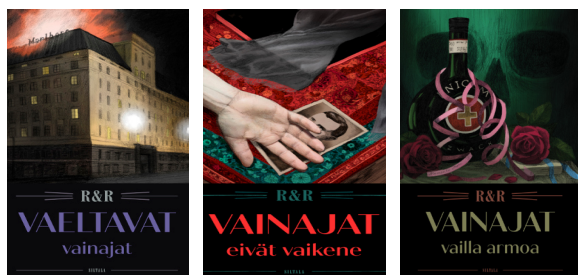

In the autumn, Birch the birch leaf is floating away from its forest tribe, and runs into Candy, a mixed mushroom, who's just suffered a breakup. In Dantean fashion, the two roam through artificially modified natural reserves, coming across the ancient, grimy Mother Nature, a wellness cult headed by a Kombucha mushroom, as well as other woodland dwellers forced to adapt to their new habitats.

The characters of the graphic adventure are like urban people: harmony-loving Birch swears by positivity and self-acceptance, woke Candy is committed to improving the world, but only on the terms of its own comfort, and patriotic Slime Mold has its mind set on doggedly pushing through the rock, despite going round it would save years of travelling.

The Natural Comedy is the third work of Ulla Donner, winner of the Finlandia Prize for the Best Graphic Novel in 2020. The sylvan fairytale grows into a hilarious satire about the Finns' "special" relationship with nature. It is a tale about a society in which nature is subordinate to the human pursuit of profit and in which heaven and hell are only separated by how well each species manages to fit around people's needs.

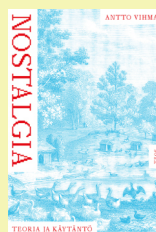

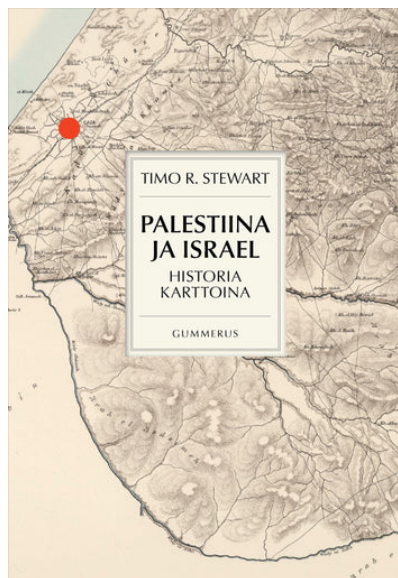

Israel and Palestine mean almost the same thing—and completely different things—at the same time. Renowned researcher Timo R. Stewart’s informative and visually appealing book helps to understand this contradiction through maps drawn at different times.

Palestine and Israel. A History in Maps increases understanding of the background to the Middle East conflict, using maps to guide the reader from the 19th century to the present day. It reveals the religious, political, and strategic significance of the region’s divisions at different times. The 25 featured maps were all created for different purposes and under different circumstances. Their relationship to reality is never straightforward.

Each chapter tells the story of one map: What does it reveal about the motives of their creators? What does it tell us about political and military changes in the area? How was the map used in the past? What needs did it serve?

Stewart’s clear and concise book helps the reader to understand not only historical events, but our interpretations of them. It also inspires readers to question maps more critically.



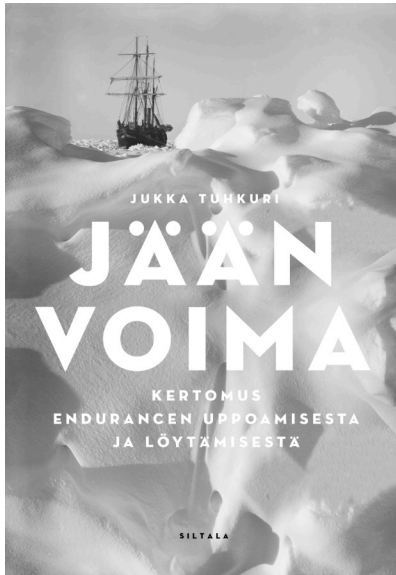
Timo R. Stewart (b. 1980), PhD in Political Science, is a senior researcher at the Finnish Institute of International Affairs, specializing in the Israeli–Palestinian conflict, Western policy in the Middle East, and the role of religion in conflicts and politics. Stewart has also worked at the Ministry for Foreign Affairs and in civil society organizations. Stewart’s books *Valter Juvelius and the Hunt for the Lost Ark* (2020), and *The Enchantment of the Promised Land* (2022), were both nominated for the Finlandia Prize for non-fiction. Stewart is the most sought-after commentator in the Finnish media regarding the Israeli–Palestinian conflict.

A breathtaking account on the discovery of the second most famous shipwreck in history.



At the dawn of 1910s, all the major conquests in the name of science and exploration seemed to have been accomplished. Traversing Antarctica from shore to shore was still up for grabs though, and the restless explorer Ernest Shackleton wasn't going to waste his time watching someone else do it.

His ship, *Endurance*, however, was crushed by ice without even reaching the Antarctic coast, leaving Shackleton and his men drifting on ice for months. The expedition became one of the most legendary of all times, but the reasons behind the sinking of *Endurance* have been mostly ignored.

In 2022, members of the international *Endurance22* expedition team boarded an ice-breaking research ship built in Finland, with the mission to locate *Endurance* lying more than 3000 m deep beneath the icy surface of Weddell Sea – and succeeded.

In his book, Jukka Tuhkuri, a scientist with the expedition, retells the Shackleton myth in a new light. In addition to the historical events leading to the original expedition and his own experiences on the Antarctic journey, Tuhkuri sheds light on the crushing of *Endurance* by sea ice. At the same time, the author explains how modern scientists evaluate the effects of climate change on sea ice, and what it means to polar shipping and our future.

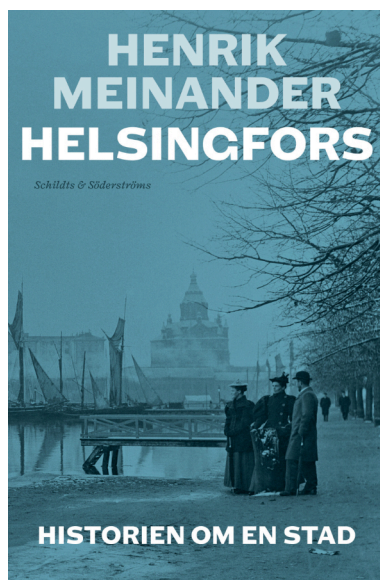

In 2022 he participated in the *Endurance22* expedition, which successfully located the wreck of the *Endurance*.

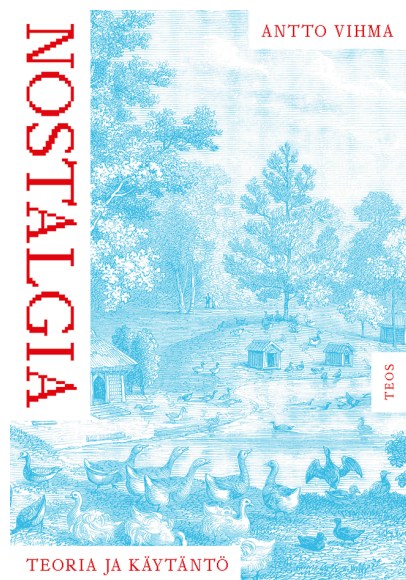

Author Karin Erlandsson was a teenager when she decided to make her dream come true and knit herself a jumper. Without using instructions, she made a beautiful striped jumper out of the leftover yarn she found at home. She wore it a lot and it was widely admired. A deep and life-long love had been born.

In *The Blue Yarn* Erlandsson weaves together a nonfiction book, in which personal memories expand into sharp observations about the effects of knitting on the knitter, those close to them, and society at large. In it, knitting is presented not only in terms of clothing and preserving tradition, but also as a means of creating and conveying something new. As the world around us burns, it can be a way to survive – or to break the ranks. For those who are busy and stressed, it can be a means of recovering and finding balance.

Knitters have always been part of a long, somewhat invisible, tradition, which has especially been upheld by women from one century to the next. There is a magic in knitting not unlike the magic of writing.

The Blue Yarn: What I Know About Knitting by award-winning novelist Karin Erlandsson is an inspiring book seasoned with knitting humour about the history of knitting, women who knit, and its enduring appeal.



Karin Erlandsson (b. 1978) is a Finnish author writing in Swedish. She has also written a four-part series of children's novels called *Song of the Eye Gemstone*. The first novel of the four, *Pearl Fisher* (2017) received the Runeberg Junior Prize and was nominated for the Nordic Council Children and Young People's Literature Prize, similarly to the fourth novel *Victor* (2019) and Erlandsson's stand-alone middle-grade adventure *Night Express* (2020). In addition, she has published works of nonfiction.





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
